

# 44 Teams Will Participate In International Bantam Tournament

The 14th annual Georgetown International Bantam Hockey Tournament, which is one of the finest tournaments in Canada, will be held this year from Saturday, March 16 to Saturday, March 23. Tournament chairman Harry Levy says the 44 team positions have been filled. Mr. Levy said he already has teams placed on standby status should any of the 44 teams drop out. He expects some 50 to 40 team entries to arrive between now and the tournament date.

Last year, some eight teams dropped out of the tournament, most due to the OMHA finals. No team can forfeit the OMHA finals to play in a tournament.

Teams are placed in tournament slots on a first come, first serve basis.

Last year's champions from Peterborough will be back to defend their title in addition to teams from Ontario, Quebec, and the northern United States.

Teams are placed in one of four divisions depending on the population of the area they represent. Class A teams represent areas of towns with a population over 35,000; Class B teams represent towns with a population between 15,000 and 35,000; Class C teams are from towns with a population between 5,000 and 15,000; Class D is comprised of teams representing a centre with less than 5,000 persons.

A total of 79 games are played during the week. Each day sees 12 games, with seven games going on the final day. The winners of divisions "A" and "C" meet in a semi-final while winners in "B" and "D" divisions meet in a similar semi-final. The winners of these matches meet in the final game.

The only change in the tournament format this year will be in the timing of the third period. Previously the first two periods were straight time with the third period played stop time. Mr. Levy says this has been changed so that only the last five minutes of the game will be stop time. This hopefully will keep the tournament schedule more or less on time.

Each competing team pays a \$20 entry fee which helps pay for the two hot meals a day the sponsoring Georgetown Kinsmen provide, as well as transportation and sundry fees. The players will use the Legion hall dining facilities for their meals. Each team is allowed 15 dressed players, and teams that travel a long distance are billeted in local homes.

The Georgetown Referees Association provide the referees for the tournament. Mr. Levy praised the association saying "without the referees, we just couldn't have this tournament."

Tournament week passes will cost two dollars for adults and one dollar for students. No games will be played on the Sunday. Daily admission for those without the week passes will be fifty cents per adult and twenty five cents per student.
