Is Anybody Listening?

Giant telescopes peer out into the vastness of space. Space. Filled with myriads of stars and galaxies. All dancing and whirling. Hurrying on to destiny. At the end of time.

Men of earth have always been fascinated with the "heavens"; with what's out there beyond what we know. Early philosophers built their neat, compact view of the heavenly bodies moving around the earth and astrologers mused about the destiny of man connected with the stars. Today radio astronomers scan the immeasurable cons of the universe searching out new galaxies and wondering whether we are alone on earth. Unique amid the countless stars. Created to discover new worlds and eventually to conquer the hazards and lightyears of space.

Beams of radio waves in varving frequencies are emmitted from space-station Earth, hoping that someone, somewhere-out there-will pick up the signal and relay a message back to earth.

"Anybody listening way out there?" Isn't that the way it is when we beam our prayers toward heaven? Don't we really wonder whether "He's up there listening to us?" And if we don't receive a message back, if there is no immediate answer to our prayer, we are tempted to "give up."

To say there's nobody up there listening. Jesus had a rather challenging way about him as he instructed his disciples. In the Sermon on the Mount he taught his disciples how to pray by giving them the Lord's Prayer. Then he went on, "Ask, and you will receive; seek, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened. For everyone who asks receives, he who seeks finds, and to him who knocks, the door will be opened." (Matt. 7:7-8 NEB)

With these words Jesus is really saying that prayer is no easy matter; it is not simply "Now I lay me down to sleep" matter. Prayer involves struggle-like Jacob wrestling with the angel.
Like Jesus wrestling with the devil in the wilderness and again in the Garden of Gethsemane. When Jesus prayed all night, as apparently he often did, we can be sure he was not simply and quietly waiting before God. His whole being was alert and open to receive what his heavenly Father was willing for him at that particular time. Before the Cross Jesus too must have wendered whether anybody up there was listening.

Yet the struggle is not with God, but with ourselves. We speak many words, or the same words over and over again, not because they are needed to persuade God (God does not hear our words as such), but because we are seeking to overcome our own pride, selfishness or indifference. We agonize to get free of the bondage to our own wills which keeps us from really praying. The struggle in prayer, then, is not our struggle with God, but God's struggle with us. He is in fact, "up there listening to us"-but sometimes He may be wondering if anyone down here is listening to Him.


EXPLANATORY NOTE
