Raiders Zap Dundas, Playing Like Champs

Georgetown Raiders are playing like a championship club, and with playoffs on tap in March in Intermediate A hockey, that's understandable. The Raiders capped a four-game winning streak Sunday, by downing the Dundas Merchants 8-1 in Georgetown. On Friday, in an away-game, the Raiders dumped Dundas 9-6, and during the week, the hometown team whalloped the Dunnville Mudcats 10-1. Previous to that, the Raiders had scored a win in Georgetown over the Oakville Adanacs. Sunday's game was a Georgetown win from the opening whistle. The Raiders scored three goals in the opening period, two more in the middle stanza, and a final three goals in the last 20 minutes. Lone Oakville tally came in the second period, off the stick of Doug Cook. He snared a pass from Marty Zuchotski and whipped the puck behind goalie Keith Pallett. Blake Inglis was a big scoring gun for the Raiders. He assisted on the third Georgetown goal of the first period, by Doug Selby, and scored two goals of his own in the second period. Inglis is an experienced addition to the club, this season. He sports number six jersey, vacated by Jim Prosser who has quit the club. Junior Tibbitts opened the scoring for Georgetown at the 13:45-minute mark of the first period, and five seconds later, Peter Kennedy bounced in on a surprised Merchant goalie, Bob Aitken, to score unassisted. Inglis scored the only Georgetown goal of the second period. In the third frame, Ray Tonelli, who was skating with all the power of a freight train, opened the scoring for Georgetown, Doug Tate scored

the next goal, and Tom Gilbert added the final marker of the night. Gilbert assisted on the Tate goal and Tibbitts assisted on the Gilbert goal. There's a big weekend on tap for the Raiders. Oakville Adanacs are due to pay a return visit in Georgetown, Friday, at 8:30 p.m., and on Sunday, Dundas Merchants return, at 8 p.m., for a rebuttal. Concerning the Adanacs, the Raiders have whipped that club four times on home ice and have been beaten five times on Adanac ice. Friday's game should be an equalizer for the Raiders. OFFSIDES: Blake Inglis scored two goals during the game, Sunday, but he missed an important shot for a fan, Ricky Knight. Knight won the program draw, and selected Inglis to take the centre-ice shot. Inglis was close, but the puck missed the mark by an inch or so. Joe Donald, wearing number 11, was dressed for the Merchants, but he served only one shift on the ice and then watched the remainder of the game as a spectator from the stands. One of the OHA referees for the game was Ken McLeod, now of Cambridge, but formerly of Timmins, who gained some experience several years ago as a linesman-in-training for the National Hockey League. McLeod was an arena manager in Timmins until he left that city in September of last year. Backup goalie for the Raiders, Bruce Jackson, has been seeinghome games from a seat next to the players' box. In full uniform, he's on hand in case Pallett gets into trouble, but Pallett's performance has been steadily improving as he gets into shape between the pipes.

Ray Evans took a slashing call in the second period, and when his two minutes were up, got back onto the ice just in time to assist on the second Inglis goal. Evans got the puck to Inglis who was spotted right in front of the Dundas net. Tom Gilbert whistled a hard shot over the Dundas net, near the midpoint of the third period, and like good basketball players, the Raiders swooped in for the rebound. The effort paid off.
