True curlers would rather lose than to win by unfair means. No attempt is made during play to distract a player from doing his best. No curler will breach the rules of the game and if he does he will be the first to admit it.

Curling is an amateur sport and no player enters the game for profit either to himself or his team. Uniforms are worn by teams but you will fail to find them advertizing any commercial product. To do so would take away its amateur standing and there are no professional curlers.

It is a family game in which all members of the family may take part on an equal footing. Curling is a game that neither needs nor permits betting to enjoy it as a pastime. It is played for the love of the game alone.

Neither wealth or social position is considered but rather the worth of the player as a man is what counts. While the games played are to determine the relative skill of the players it should ever be borne in mind that the criteria of curling is to develop a manly recreation and to promote goodwill.

This spirit should prevail in the interpretation and application of all rules connected with any bonspiel.

Legion Policy On Their Sports

Since a humble beginning on the demobilization of the servicemen in 1946, the Ontario Provincial Command of the Royal Canadian Legion has won wide approval among the branches, and has been the pattern on which operation fitness and other commands have planned their sports and recreation programs. The policy of the Legion Sports Program in

Ontario has been threefold:

(a) To encourage friendly competition among branches, zones, districts, leading to Command Championships in bowling, billiards, darts, snooker, horseshoes, golf, cribbage, curling, euchre, bridge, lawn bowling, shuffleboard and peewee baseball.

(b) A complete recreation program in which all branches and all members can participate.
(c) The sponsoring of Legion branches in

every community of some form of minor sports, and full co-operation with organized minor sports groups throughout Ontario.

Sportsmanship comradeship and friendly competition have been stressed in Legion sports.

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
