It is high time that the foolhardiness involved in most snowmobile accidents is publicized to such an extent that snowmobilers everywhere are made aware of the need for care and caution in the operation of these motorized snow vehicles.

A 15-year-old boy died from injuries received when he drove his snowmobile into the rear end of a manure spreader. The accident occurred after dark and the lane in which the manure spreader was standing and the accident occurred was icy and full of ruts.

The pathologist's blood samples showed the victim had 99 per cent alcohol in his system at the time of the accident. Yet the coroner's jury investigating the death suggested that improved braking and steering systems for snowmobiles might have prevented this fatal accident. Any motorized vehicle similarly driven under such conditions would in all probability have resulted in a serious accident and resultant injury or death.

Here is another instance which fortunately had a happier ending. A group of people were ice fishing on the west arm of Lake Nipissing. A four-year-old boy had been taken for a snowmobile ride by an adult. At the end of the ride the child was left on the machine with the motor running. The small boy grabbed the throttle and the machine took off.

The 35 h.p. snowmobile was travelling at high speed before an alert male member of the party jumped on another machine and gave chase. He was gaining on the runaway snowmobile when it struck a pile of rocks, bounced into the air, cut off a tree which was 23 inches in circumference and burst into flames. The man was close enough to jump from his machine and remove the child from the flaming wreckage just in time to save his life.

The man who saved this boy's life should be congratulated for his heroic action and it points out the advisability of always turning off the ignition of a snowmobile when it is left standing and removing the ignition key.

It seems I have to defend myself so, I will clear this matter up first. In reference to the letter in readers forum of Feb. 13, 1974 Herald, by Bob Mills of the Georgetown Anglers & Hunters. The voluntary license idea has been credited to the proper individual in last week's column.

How many times has the public had the opportunity of reading about the Georgetown Anglers & Hunters in the last year or two. This is for the nesting box program they have, where the sportsmen or vice versa build the boxes and someone else, or as a joint effort, erect and place these nesting boxes under the guidance of the ministry. These are for Canada geese, woodduck, song birds, etc.

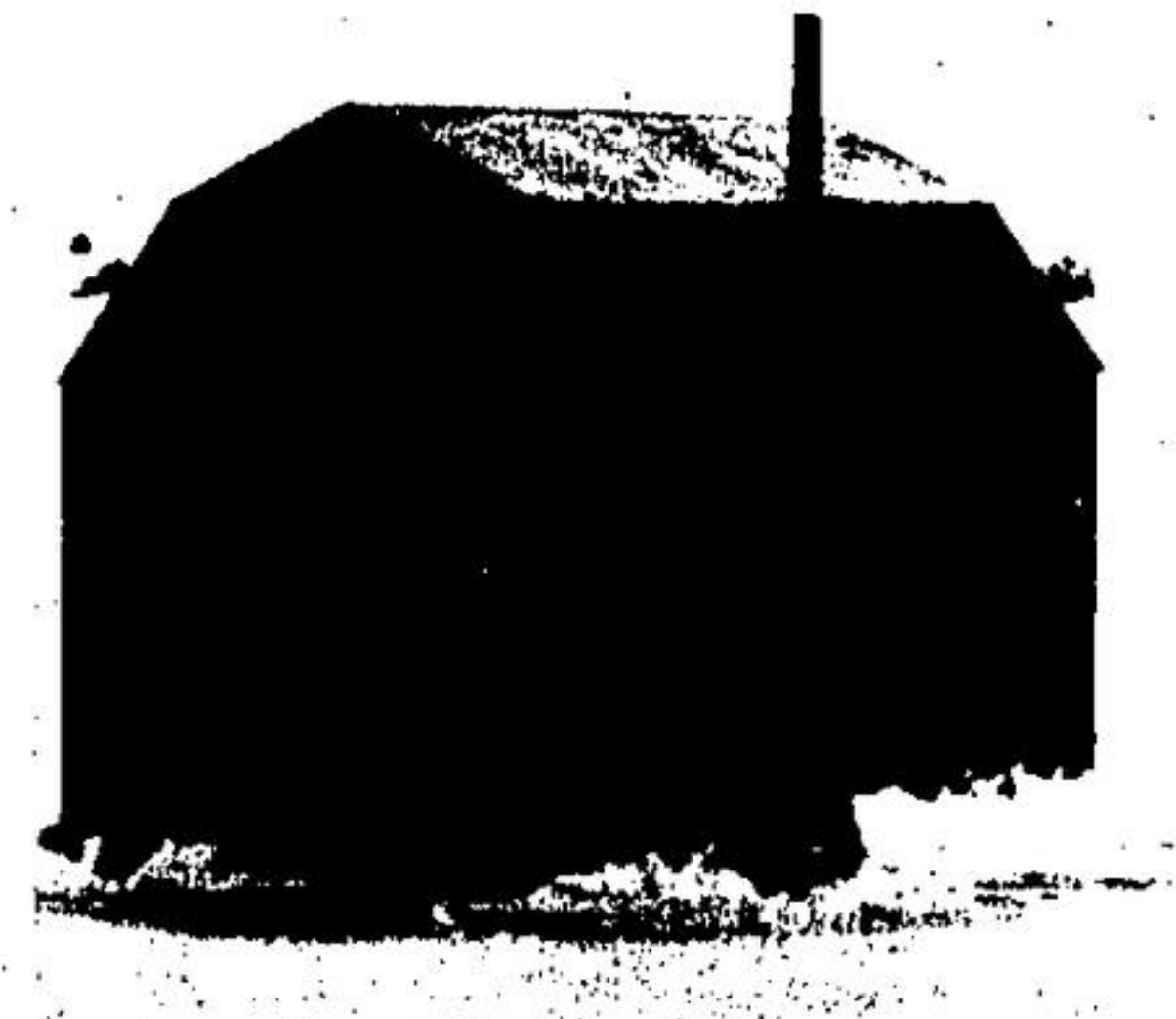
On March 18, the South Peel Naturalist club will be joining with the Oakville Rod and Gun Club. The boxes made will be put out some time near the end of March. They hope to have 50 bluebird houses by that time.

Each one when installed will be numbered, and the ministry will provide statistics on the success of them by the serial number on each one. The final day of installation will be in the form of a family outing with the gun club and the naturalists, where they will have a cook out.
