needed for heart surgery scheduled for Toronto hospitals for March 5th. There were 88 new registrations, of which 36 were first donors. Four

hundred and forty seven attended the clinic and 48 persons were rejected as donors for reasons of low blood counts, bad colds, or

taking medication and allergy shots, pregnancy, or being over the age of 65. In 1973, 417 attended the March clinic, 20 were rejected and



397 blood packs were filled. Donors came from Acton, Brampton, Orangeville, Milton and even as far as Toronto. At left, members of

The letter would protest the CBC not giving any live TV coverage of the World Cup and indicate displeasure with FIFA for selling the American Hemisphere World Cup TV rights to entrepreneurs who are after a big profit. In Europe lack of TV coverage for this event would be enough to bring down a government.
