## Tenders Called For Museum Construction Says MPP Snow

Jim Snow, MPP Halton East and Minister of Government Services, has announced the calling of tenders for the construction of stage two of a new Agricultural Museum, which will become the first public institution of its type to represent the entire Province of Ontario.

A Ministry of Agriculture and Food project, the museum will be situated on a 92-acre site, adjacent to the Kelso Conservation Area, west of the Town of Milton and south of Highway 401.

Wilson, the museum will cover a gross area of 20,000 square feet. With two connecting wings and a partial mezzanine area, the building will provide exhibition space for agricultural equipment, models, documents and other artifacts. There will also be a workshop for the construction of exhibits and the restoration of machinery, as well as an implement storage area, an office and a meeting room.

Contract specifications call for concrete foundations, walls

constructed from load bearing masonry, with the roof structure to be a steel deck on steel framing. Interior finishes include painted masonry walls, painted steel ceilings and concrete and crushed stone floors. The building will be heated by an oil-fired, warm air system. Expected completion date for the Agricultural Museum is early 1975.

Most of the project's first stage—site work, including the construction of gravel roads

and parking lots—was completed during the summer of 1973 by students of the "Heavy Equipment School", located near Milton, and a branch of Sheridan College of Applied Arts and Technology. Still to be completed, when weather permits, is the spreading of top soil and seeding.

Stage three of the project centres on future development of the rest of the acreage. Planning will include an historical park in which pioneer farmsteads would be located and restored on site, to represent various regions, periods and types of Ontario agriculture.
