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Raiders Are Off To Lively

Georgetown Raiders are off to Northern Ontario to meet the Lively Cyclones in intermediate A hockey playoffs. The best-of-three series is scheduled to start Friday. There will be a second game Saturday, and if a third game is necessary, it will be played Sunday.

The Raiders blitzed Port Colborne Sailors 10-2, Monday, in Georgetown, to win the right to meet the Cyclones. Remaining games to settle the league championship, between Georgetown and Port Colborne, will continue after the Raiders have gone all the way to a Canadian title, or are knocked out of further competition.

Because of a delay in local playoffs, a three-game series was decided upon between Georgetown and Port Colborne to select a winner to meet the Lively team. Sunday, in Port Colborne, the Raiders nipped the Sailors 5-2.

Monday's game was a Georgetown victory all the way. The Raiders piled up a commanding six-goal lead at end of the first period, added one more in the second frame, and wrapped up the scoring with three goals in the final 20 minutes.

Only scoring by the Sailors came in the second period, when Bruce Waters and Mike Green scored for the visitors.

Ray Tonelli was the scoring gun for the Raiders. He got another three goals in the Monday match, and picked up another two assists. He scored one of the five Georgetown goals in the Sunday game.

Duane Rutley was another high-flying marksman for the Raiders. He scored the two opening goals of the game, a fast one at the 14-second mark of the first period, and the second still under the minute mark, at 41 seconds. Rutley also had two assists.

Tom Gilbert had two goals, one in the first and another in the third period. Doug Tate scored for Georgetown in the first, Bill Currie got the last goal of the game in the third, and Pete Kennedy opened the

scoring for the Raiders in the second period. Kennedy only scored one goal, but he was a key man on the plays that counted, and he earned four assists in the game. Defenceman John Boyce was also strong in the play-making department and he was credited with three assists. Another defenceman, Neil Cotton, got an assist, and later was bounced out of the game during a penalty call.

SLAPSHOTS
A collision between Port Colborne goalie Rob Stewart and forward Ray Evans of the Raiders left Evans winded and in need of a break from the game. He left the ice but returned for the final minutes of play. Stewart collected a sore head. Bill Currie took a third-period slapshot that had all the accuracy of a bullet, and it went into the Port Colborne net for a goal. Kibitzers were out in full force for the game. And one of their points of attack was a Sailor defenceman Terry Roy, a big solid fellow who handled a lot of the policing duties inside the blue line for his club. Roy ended the game in a fracas, but before he left the ice, he fielded this epithet: "Hey, number four, we're having a birthday party. You wanna come as a balloon?"

Final fight of the game was between Roy and Evans, and came in the last six seconds of play. Evans didn't come out much the worse for wear, but he was pummeled to the ice at the big hands of Roy. Evans was credited only with a minor roughing penalty but Roy was charged with high sticking and fighting. Because the game was over, neither had to serve the time.

Third period was a busy one for the referees, mainly in the penalty department. At one point, mid-way in the period, there were as many men confined to the sin bins as there were on the playing benches. One set-to involved Paul Robinson of the Raiders and Jean Latulippe of the Sailors. Both went off for fighting, with Latulippe drawing an extra two minutes for kneeing.
