FORTY HOUR FAMINE **BEGINS NEXT WEEK**

More than 17,200 children of the world will die of malnutrition in the next 40 hours. Hence the title - "Project 17,200+". Project 17,200+ is a planned famine campaign, sponsored by World Vision of Canada. To quote from World Vison's official

magazine, 'Heartline': "For 40 hours this Easter at least 2,000 Canadians will find out voluntarily what it is like to enter the early stages of starvation." Most participants will begin their 40 hour famine period at 8.00 p.m., Thursday evening, April 11, until 12.00 noon, Saturday. During that time participants will take only liquids such as tea, coffee, pop, juice, or water. Young and old can participate without ill effects.

Each participant is asked to obtain sufficient sponsors for a total of \$4.00 per hour, or \$160.00 in total. Those participants who are able to raise \$160.00 will be given the choice of using these funds for the personal sponsorship of a needy child throughout the next 12 month period, or simply to forward the money to World Vision for use in the overall famine relief program.

Most of us have read and heard of the tragic famine in the Sahel belt of Africa (Sahel is Arabic for 'fringe', meaning the border of the Sahara desert.). Some 14 million people in the six countries bordering the Sahara were directly affected by the 5 year drought which brought severe famine this year. Thousands upon thousands of people have died, besides hundreds of thousands of

Last year over 6,000 people, young and old, particpants and supporters; entered the 40 hour planned famine together raised over \$50,000 to alleviate desperate emergencies in India, Africa, and Indonesia.

"With the growing number of horrifying stories coming from Africa, particularly of the number of children dying from starvation and malnutrition, we at World Vision feel that there was never a more vital time than in 1974 to show that Canadians really care about such needs." 
