There were four fires in Halton Hills on Saturday. The most serious was at 177 Mountainview Road South, the home of Mr. E. Jones. Seek To Update **Pool Facilities**

The Georgetown Lions Club wants to update the facilities surrounding the Georgetown pool. Fred Zorge told the General Administration committee Monday night.

Mr. Zorge explained that the present facilities were adequate when the pool was constructed, b. more work is necessary. He told councillors that the pool lacked showers and adequate washroom facilities.

"We'd like to tear down thesurface facilities and begin updating the change rooms and other facilities," he said. "Also, we'd like to add something, a hall of our own."

Originally, the Lions built the pool and facilities and donated the land to the town, Now, Mr. Zorge proposed that the club repurchase the land and complete the facilities.

"We would then donate it back to the town and set up an agreement for a small rent for our hall in the building," he told the committee. "Nothing can be done until September when the season is over, but we need the time to prepare plans and get approvals."
