Workshop Held At Museum

The Ontario Costume Society held a two day workshop at the Halton Regional Museum, Kelso Park, Milton recently. Under the direction of the Society's chairman, Mrs. E. Collard, and Mrs. C. Frisken of the Peterborough Centennial Museum, the participants studied the proper procedures for handling antique costumes.

The workshop dealt with the basic "do's and don't's" of costume care. The instructors used the museum's own costume collection to demonstrate the correct method of repairing, cleaning, pressing, labelling and storing old garments.

Over 50 membership applications were received. Only 20 were accepted to guarantee active participation for all the members in the various aspects of the course. Among those present were representatives from Simcoe County Museum, Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry Historical Society; Bradley Museum, Clarkson; Sombra Township Museum; Gibson House, Toronto; Joseph Brant Museum, Brantford; Wellington Community Museum; Lake of the Woods Museum, Kenora; and Strathroy Middlesex Museum.

The workshop was accredited by the Ontario Museums Association. A museum employee aspiring to the position of curator must attend the required number of workshops and seminars set down by this association.

Written assignments relating to the courses, and a thesis are graded by the association; and the curator's certificate is received when the specified number of credits have been accumulated. Workshops like the Costume Society's are, open of course, to any interested museum personnel.

A catering committee of the Friends of the Museum presented french menus for the workshop's two luncheons: Saturday - *consomme au croûtons, Flemish carbonnade de boeuf, coq au vin, tossed salad, hot homemade bread, fresh fruit cocktail, homemade cookies*; Sunday - *vichyssoise, quiche lorraine, french tourtiere, salad and cheese wedges, brandied fruit with ice cream*. The Ontario Costume Society is making tentative plans for another workshop at the museum in the fall dealing with costume display.

Canada Cancer Awards

Awards totalling \$2,723,801 to Ontario research workers have been announced by the National Cancer Institute of Canada.

This total is part of the \$6,072,583 to be distributed to support research into the cause and possible cure of cancer. Most of the funds will come from the April campaign of the Canadian Cancer Society which is affiliated with the Institute.

The largest single grant (\$452,157) went to the Cancer Research Unit at the University of Western Ontario, directed by Dr. J. A. McCarter.

Substantial grants also went to the directors of the two divisions of the Ontario Cancer Institute. Dr. J. E. Till, Director of the Division of Biological Research, received \$426,335, while Dr. H. E. Johns, Director of the Division of Physics Research, was awarded \$322,580.

Other awards were made to: the University of Toronto, Children's Psychiatric Research Institute, London; University of Guelph; Guelph, Carleton University, Ottawa; Queen's University, Kingston; University of Windsor, Windsor; York University, Toronto; University of Waterloo, Waterloo; McMaster University, Hamilton; Mount Sinai Hospital and Hospital for Sick Children, both in Toronto.

Several teams of investigators are studying different aspects of leukemia while other projects include the study of immune mechanisms during the development and control of neoplasia, diet and breast cancer and immunotherapy in man and animals bearing tumors.

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
