## Six Conservation Areas Make Up Credit Watershed

The Credit River watershed covers 414 square miles stretching 55 miles from Lake Ontario to Orangeville and west to Acton and Hillsburgh. Travelling time and expense and limited staff contribute to the policy of leasing back Authority-owned lands to the local municipalities for use as recreational open space.

**ERINDALE CONSERVATION AREA**  
Purchased in 1959 from Ontario Hydro, the lowlands of this 132 acre area originally made up the bottom of the reservoir formed when the Erindale dam was used to

provide power. For about five years the area was used as a landfill site. It was leased back to the Town of Mississauga in 1970 for recreational use.

**STREETSVILLE CONSERVATION AREA**  
In 1970, 33 acres on the Credit River was purchased with Streetsville as the benefiting municipality. This property connects to parkland already owned by the town and contains an interesting nature trail through a wooded area. This property was leased back to the Town of Streetsville for recreational use.

**ERIN CONSERVATION AREA**  
The ruins of an old woolen mill still stand on the eight acres purchased in 1965 and leased back to the Village of Erin for recreation use.

**MISSISSAUGA VALLEY LANDS**  
Two parcels of land—45 acres on Creditview Road north of Britannia Road and 5.6 acres of

1973 with Mississauga as the benefiting municipality. These are leased back to Mississauga for park purposes.

**LAKE ONTARIO WATERFRONT**  
The Authority purchased 4.05 acres on the Lake Ontario shoreline as an addition to

RATRAY MARSH (the Waterfront Plan in 1972, the 25 acre Ratray Marsh is leased back to the City of Mississauga under a special agreement to protect the ecology of the area from human abuse.

Since that time, the association has introduced many new varieties of forages and grains to the county, conducted experiments on herbicides and insecticides, and promoted new technology in field crops.
