The authority forest conversation areas consist of several blocks of land acquired during the past few years for the purposes of forest management.

The authority proposes to continue its reforestation program with the spring and fall planting of 25,000 trees, carrying out an extensive woodlot improvement program, boundary (encing, necessary drainage works, erection of signs and other general work.

All member municipalities will bear the authority's share of the cost.


