

Principled Love For Man And Creator Lacking In World Witnesses Believe

"Lack of love is the single most compelling reason for today's world turmoil," says Georgetown resident Len Lambert, spokesman for 100 area Jehovah's Witnesses.

Old Papers Aid School In Halton

Volunteers from Georgetown District Christian School loaded 11 tons of sorted newspapers into a truck, recently, and proceeds from the sale of the paper, for recycling, goes to benefit the school.

Papers are donated by persons who like to see discarded paper put to good use, which also fights pollution.

There was a weekly pickup of paper during April on Saturday mornings, but pickup time has been rescheduled to Wednesday evening beginning in May. Many persons who want to travel on weekends will find the midweek pickup of greater benefit.

The paper is sorted by volunteers, a considerable task. No glossy paper or egg cartons and the like are left in. But all such material is sold separately, so nothing goes to waste.

Christian school is a parent-controlled school, which means that the cost of education for children attending the school is met by parents and supporters.

This includes building, teacher salaries, books, transportation and the like. Approximately 100 families send their children to the seven-room school, located on the Seventh Line in the former Evesham Township, with approximately 200 children attending classes.

Pupils are bused to the school from Acton as well as Georgetown.

No specific project has been determined, yet, to make use of the proceeds from the paper sale. Supporters of the school are positive, however, that with today's rising cost of education (the school receives no provincial grants) finding a source worthy of the funds will not be difficult.

Three Big Questions About Man's Destiny

At some time in our lives we ask ourselves three questions. Where did I come from? Where am I going? How do I get there?

WHERE DID I COME FROM?
There is, of course, more than one answer to the question. The scientist would look at the question from a purely material viewpoint. He would say that we are largely composed of water, but there is enough iron in us to make a nail, enough lime to whitewash a backhouse, enough fat to make several bars of soap, enough phosphorus to tip 2,500 matches, enough sugar to fill a sugar bowl, and enough potassium to make a firecracker. This in one way is the origin of man.

A Biologist would say that we were the result of an act of physical union between a man and a woman, so we were either the product of a moment's passion, or the result of a true and faithful love.

Ask a Christian, and he would tell you that everyman is a child of God, and for every man coming into the world God has a special task and a special destiny.

Life for the Christian has nothing to do with combined chemical elements, nor is it the result of a chance act, life is basically the gift of God.

WHERE AM I GOING?
There are many in the world to-day who would tell you that we are going nowhere. They would tell you that life inevitably ends at the moment of death, and after that there is nothing, it will be like dropping into a deep dreamless sleep from which there is no awakening.

If this is true, then does it really matter how we use life? In fact, if we hold this viewpoint the most sensible thing to do is to enjoy life to its uttermost with no thought of the morrow, or of the people that we live with, because in a very real sense it would not ultimately matter what we did with life.

Ask a Christian, and he will tell you that just as a man comes from God, so he returns to God.

If life is a conscious gift from God, then it involves judgement, and we will be asked how we used the gift, and whether we fulfilled the intentions of God? It is because of this that life is so important to a Christian, and it is because of this that a Christian finds life a meaning and significance that goes beyond life and death.

HOW DO I GET THERE?
For the man who has no belief and no purpose there is no route to follow, and he pursues an aimless way through life to a pointless end.

Ask a Christian and he will tell you that he has a map, a route guide that will lead him to his goal. The map, his Bible, at times may be difficult to follow, and sometimes he is not sure of its meaning, so he will tell you that with the map he has a guide, a guide who knows the way, and will make sure that he does not lose his way - He has Jesus Christ.

Ask a Christian, and he will tell you, we came from God, we go to God, and Jesus Christ is our guide on the way.

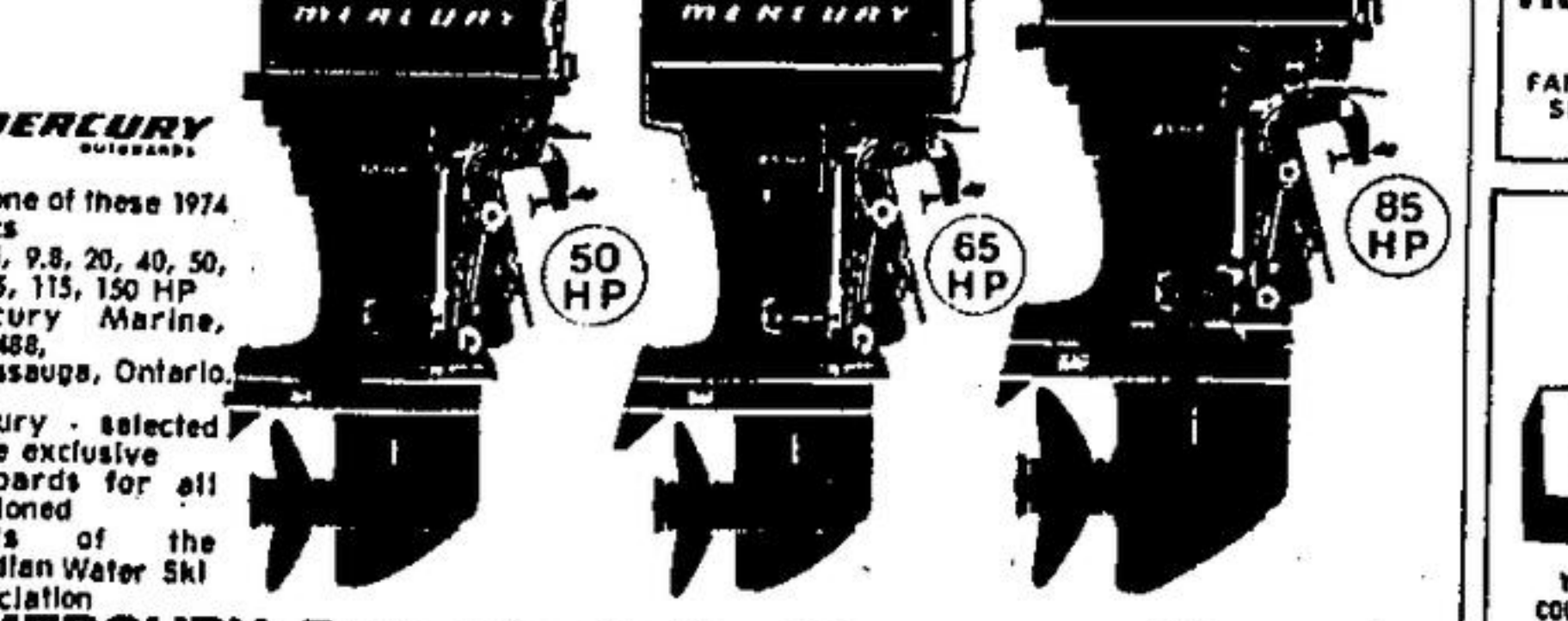

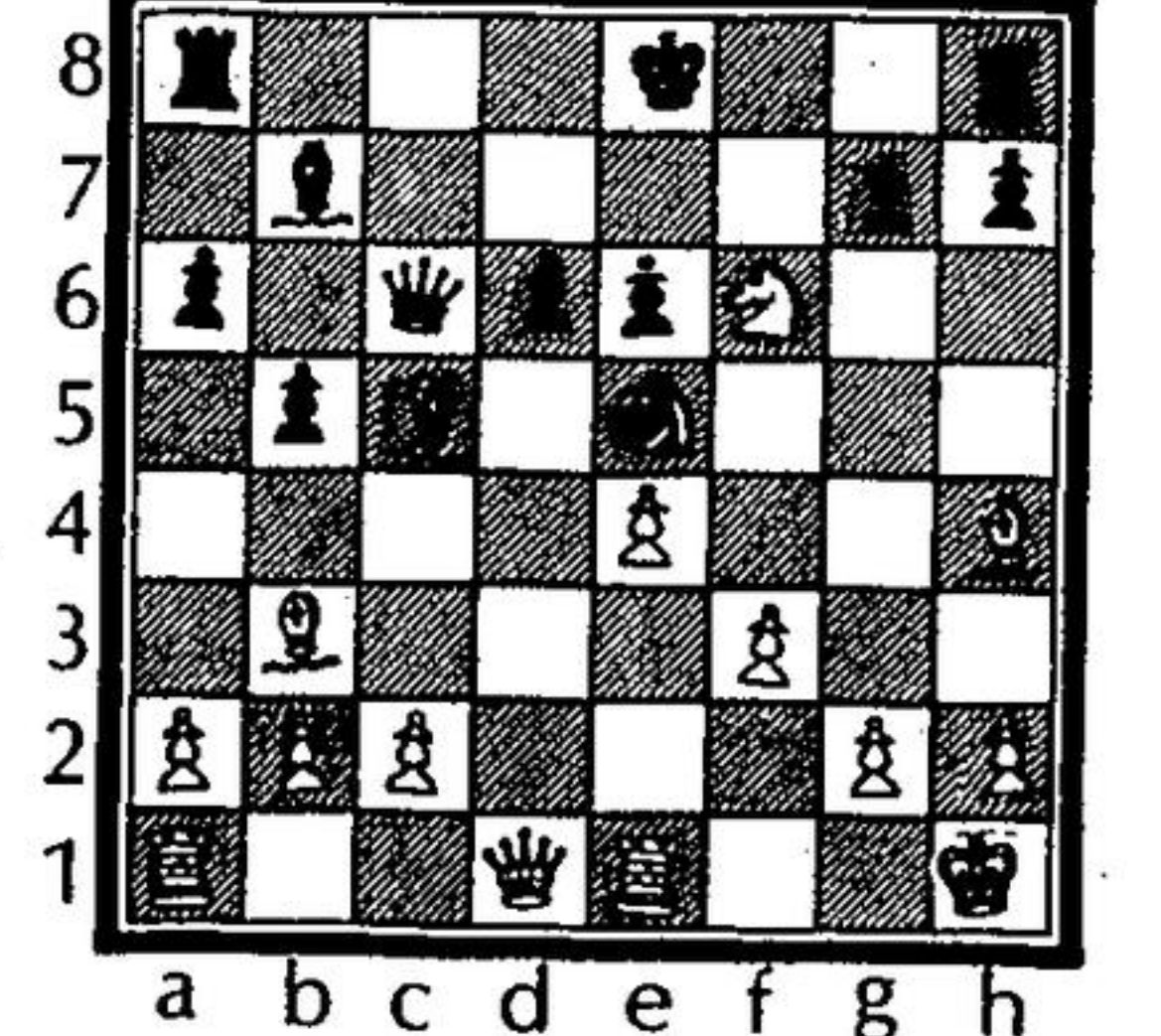

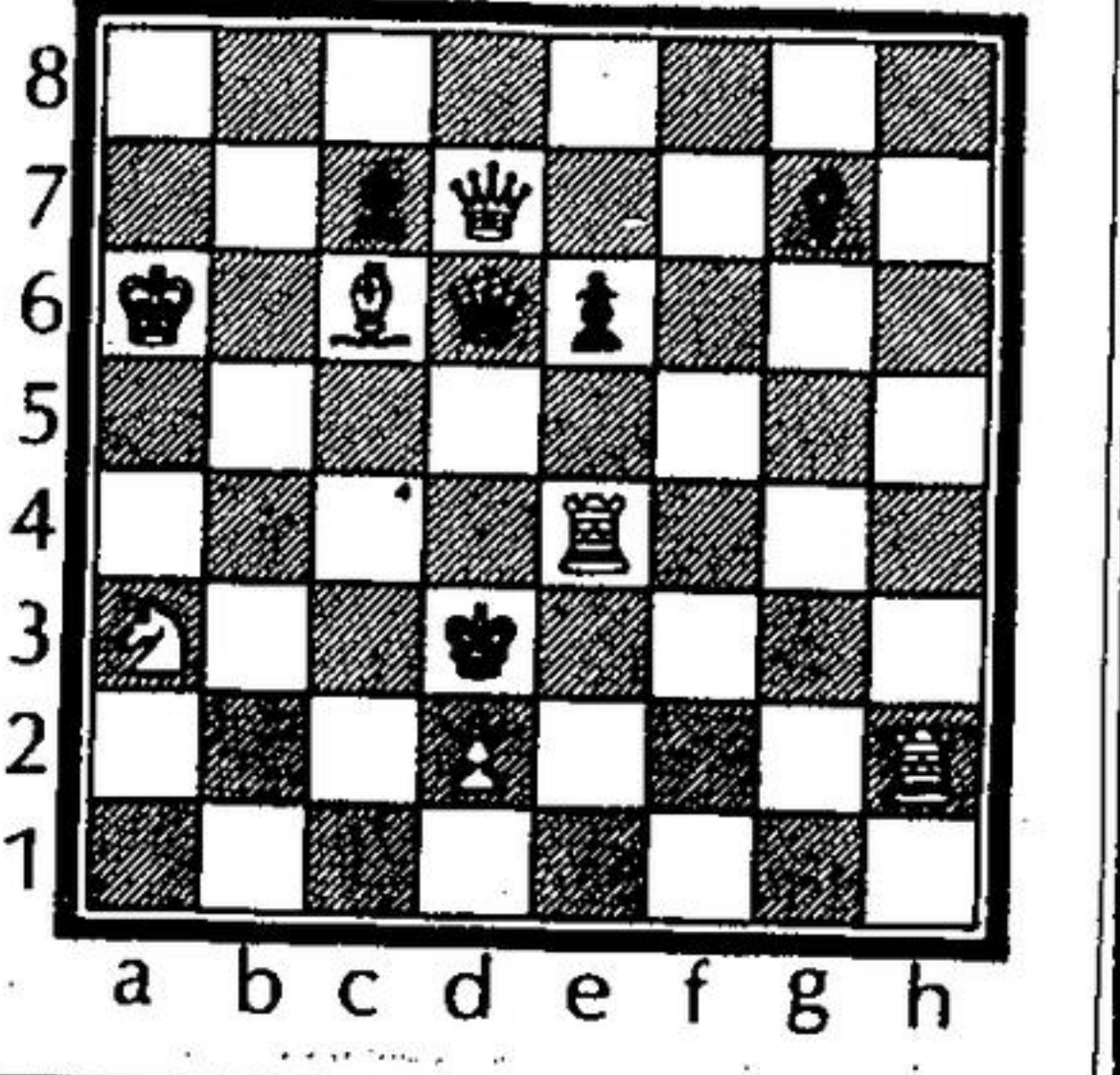
The following match was played recently in the GDHS Invitational Chess Tournament. A sacrifice on white's part proves to be more than black can handle.
