Region Body Looks At Housing Project

Ontario government officials held a special "closed" meeting with Halton Region councillors Thursday to discuss the possibility of a new government low-cost housing project in the area.

Michael Warren, deputy minister of housing and Margaret Scrivener, MPP for St. David and parliamentary assistant to the minister of housing discussed the Ontario government's new project called the Ontario Housing Action Program (OHAP).

"This meeting was to get an understanding of the basic problems involved," Mrs. Scrivener said after the meeting. "We'll have some definite answers within the next two weeks. Basically it's to provide more housing but offering financial assistance to the municipalities."

Mrs. Scrivener believed that the two-hour discussion with the council was "very good" and that the councillors were "quite interested. The next

stage of the talks will be going to the area municipalities because they will decide whether they want to enter the program," she added. The ministry of housing selected a co-ordinator for the area, Robert Holmes from Brampton. He will be a liaison with the ministry and the regional or area municipalities.

Regional Chairman Allan Mason said the discussion and questions that followed the meeting were "very interesting. However, the final approval for such a program has to come from the area municipalities," he told reporters.

Acton Students Work On Trail

Acton High School will have 20 students of the environmental science course spend two days in the Bruce Peninsula repairing trails and also along the Bruce Trail.

Dr. Paul Tamblin, the course instructor, noted that students will work between Tobermory and Wiarton repairing trails, cutting new paths and cleaning up the area.

"Members of the Bruce Trail Association will instruct us as to what to do," he said. "We decided to go to the north, because they usually do not have trouble getting volunteers for the southern sections of the trail. It'll be physically tough work for the students."

Snow To Meet Homeowners
A roadside meeting between Jim Snow, MPP for Hulton East and ratepayer Lou Hogue, RR 1 Georgetown, has been scheduled Saturday, June 1 at 10 a.m.

The meeting is to discuss maintenance problems Mr. Hogue and eight other homeowners are having with their private roadway, which is off 20th sideroad, located near Hulton.

Mr. Hogue hopes other homeowners with private roadways will attend as well as members of Halton Hills council.

IN PRINCIPLE Further Gravel Mining At Limehouse

During a committee of the whole meeting, the Halton Hills council agreed in principle to allow further gravel mining in Limehouse.

The recommendation for the mining came from the general administration committee's minutes. Coun. Roy Booth, chairman of the committee, noted that J. C. Duff Ltd. could not terminate its mining and rehabilitate the land at the present.

"If it stopped mining on its land, it would leave a steep dropoff which could not be terraced for development," he said. "The materials are necessary and the majority of it is used in Halton region."

However, Coun. Russell Miller was not in favor of the increased mining. He said that many of the area residents had complained about the excessive use of heavy trucks along the roads.

"I understood that the quarry was ready to shut down, and now, it seems that it'll be quite a few years before it does, if we agree to this," he told the councillors. "I want to know what took place at the committee meeting."

Mac Duff, representing the company, presented a brief to the committee two weeks ago outlining the reasons why it needed to expand to the extra 150 acres of land owned by Macassa Mines and another 50 acres belonging to Fred Brooks.

"We've been operating on our property for 10 years now," he said. "We aren't allowed to move, I don't know what will happen."

Mr. Duff explained that of 536,000 tons mined last year, less than one percent went to Toronto with 66.4 percent used in Halton region.

"There's a real shortage of materials in the region," he told the committee. "I don't know what you'll do around here for gravel in 10 to 15 years."

Coun. Miller, Monday, agreed that the Macassa mine site is "an awful mess" but he wanted to see some type of rehabilitation before Mr. Duff moved to the new land.

"I realize that there is a need for the material, but I'm wondering how far we'll go on this," he said.

In agreement, Coun. Len Cox felt that the Macassa property would be better if Mr. Duff mined and rehabilitated it. However, he did not like the addition of the 50 acres of the Brooks' farm.

"I'm concerned about the move to Lot 24 (the Brooks' farm)," he added. "I'm not sure it would pass the Niagara Escarpment Commission nor the Ontario Municipal Board. I think we should take the process gradually and delete the Brooks' property."

Coun. Ernie Sykes added that they could approve the addition and move for Mr. Duff in principle and work out the details later.
