Fence-viewers and livestock valuers will receive \$10 per requested settlement in Halton Hills rather than the previous wage of \$8, council has decided.

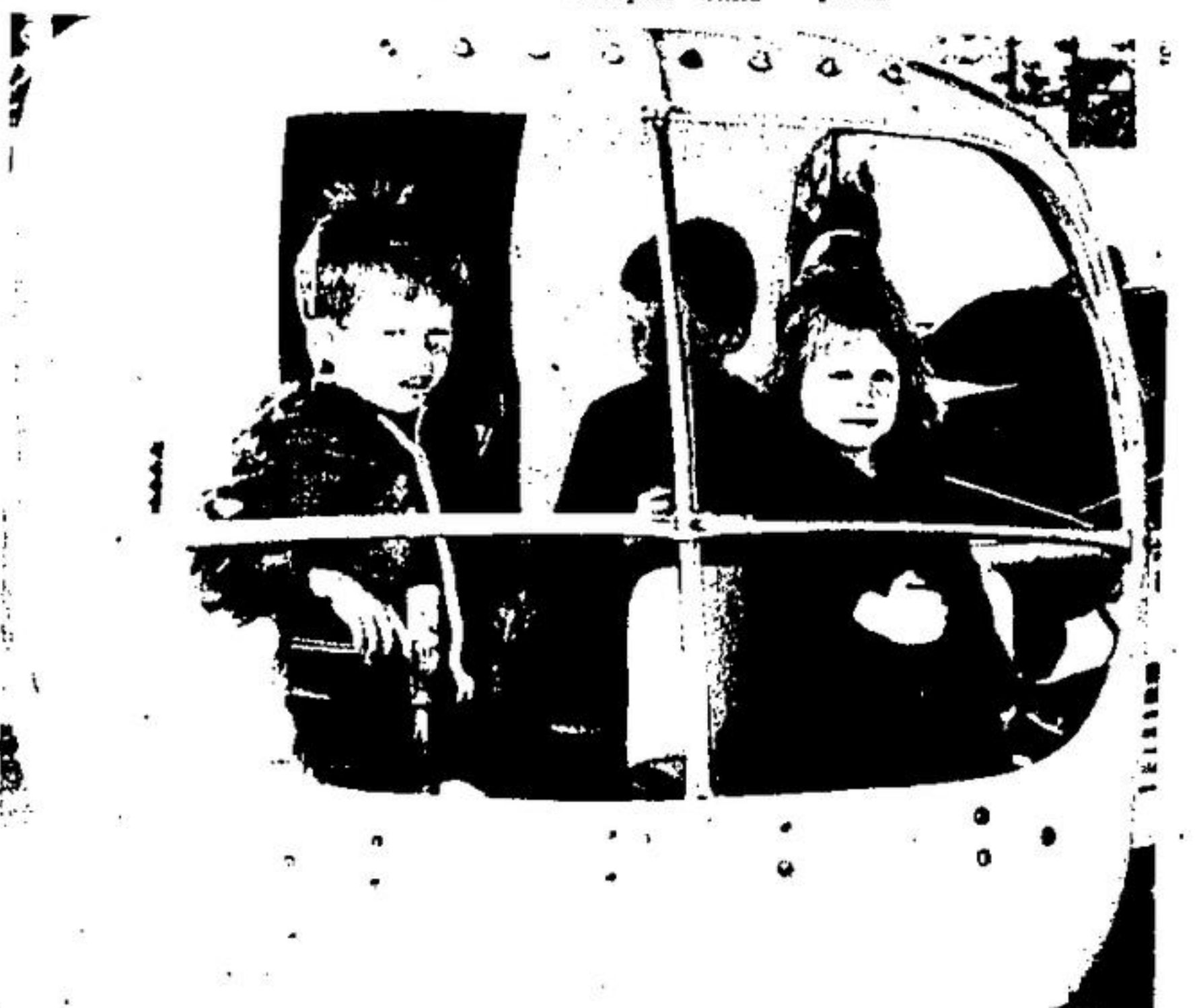

Was Musician, Teacher Kenneth Harrison Dies

The Halton Hills community was saddened when the death of Kenneth R. Harrison, ARCT, occurred May 3. He had been in ill health for several years.

At the time of his illness he was music consultant to the Halton Board of Education, after many years as music director in Georgetown schools. He was also a teacher of music and singing and many of the young people of the district will remember him in this role. He was a leader in many music festivals in the county and beyond and his choirs and vocalists attained high honors under his direction.

During his busy life he found time to act as organist and choir leader at Knox Presbyterian Church; St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, Guelph, and St. John's United Church, spanning a period from 1943 to the late 1960's.

In recent years he directed the Haltones, a musical group of local and district young people who presented concerts throughout the county. The Haltones with Knox Church choir are planning a memorial service early in June.

Mr. Harrison was born in Georgetown, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Harrison, and attended Chapel St. school and Georgetown High School. He leaves one brother, Jack of Georgetown.
