Council Provides Recreation Pamphlets

Residents of Halton Hills will receive pamphlets from the recreation department outlining their programs this summer.

Council members agreed to a resolution from Coun. Roy Booth that the pamphlets should be printed and mailed for a cost of \$950. Coun. Booth noted that the price had been reduced from an original estimate of \$1,500.

"The cost includes mailing a pamphlet to each and every resident in Halton Hills," explained Coun. Booth at the meeting last Wednesday night. "If we don't pass this, we better be prepared to advertise in the local papers for a higher cost."

By agreeing to the resolution, council halted a running argument between themselves and the recreation director.

Doug Collison, on the project. Two weeks ago, Mr. Collison was refused his request for \$1,500 for the program.

Last Tuesday night, the committee of the Whole decided to withdraw a recommendation from the General Administration Committee's Minutes which asked council to agree to the project at a cost not to exceed \$1,000.

At that time, Coun. Len Cox suggested it be withdrawn until the recreation budget was set. However, Coun. Booth pointed out that the recreation director "pleaded with us on two occasions for the pamphlets." "If it is put off until budget time, it may do irreparable harm to the program," he added.

"Council seems to be against recreation," he said. "It's getting to the point of being ludicrous. In order to provide recreation to the town, it's necessary to provide the brochures."

Coun. Armstrong denied the statement by saying, "No one on council is against recreation or the recreation director."

"I just want to know how these things are going to be distributed, through the mail, in the schools, in the town offices, how?" he added.
