Mr. John Cargo, caretaker supervisor for the Halton School Board, who had ordered the bell removed was contacted and an agreement was reached to have the bell welded on and left on the cairn. The wedding was done immediately and the WI members left satisfied for the present but are anxiously waiting to hear what the plans will be for the future of the school and if the cairn will have to be removed to some other location in the village. In the meantime many eyes will be keeping a close watch on the bell and the cairn.

The sad part of this little episode with feeling running high is that it need never have happened at all if just someone on the Halton School Board had given any thought whatever to the feelings of individuals or the community regarding the cairn and the bell. The point that Mr. Cargo made that the bell could be stolen was a good one but a little co-operation before could have eliminated a lot of hard feelings.

Ontario believes that residents 65 or over, the blind and the disabled should have an income of at least \$2600 a year.

In July, Ontario will introduce a Special Benefits program. It will place extra funds on top of federal Guaranteed Income Supplements—enough to guarantee the elderly who are qualified residents of Ontario an income of \$2600 a year. Blind and disabled people who qualify for Family Benefits will also be entitled to these special benefits.

Beginning September 1, approved drugs prescribed by a doctor or dentist will be available, free of charge, to those qualifying for the special benefits outlined above. Family Benefits or the federal Guaranteed Income Supplement. Drug cards will be mailed automatically. You don't have to apply for them.

Who will receive these special benefits?

If you are 65 or over (with an annual income of less than \$2600)...and you now receive both Old Age Security and the Guaranteed Income Supplement... you will receive your benefits cheque each month, automatically. You do not have to apply for it.

If you are 65 or over (with an annual income of less than \$2600)...and you do not receive any federal income supplement... please give us a call. Our telephone number is shown below.

If you are blind or disabled... and you now receive assistance under Ontario's Family Benefit Program... you will receive your benefits cheque each month, automatically. You do not have to apply for it.

If you are blind or disabled... and you do not receive Provincial assistance... please give us a call. Our telephone number is shown below.
