FOR THOSE of you who have an interest in refinishing and restoring of old furniture or antique's Mel has a few helpful hints that you may like to heed. The first thing that you should know is that if you intend on stripping the old finish off some piece of furniture you should do it in the summer when you are able to work outside. Mel points out that the fumes from the paint stripper are really wicked. If you have never done this type of thing before then it is best to start with a small table or something like it because it has a lot of straight edges and is not as tedious a job as a chair. You can use either paint stripper, which is very expensive and takes off everything right down to the wood. A substance called methaldehyde can also be used. This is also a toxic compound. The material takes the old finish off gradually and you can be left with the finish that happens to appear to you. That is, you have some degree of control over what happens when you are stripping a piece of furniture. Finally the material to use during this procedure is not an old rag but very fine steel wool. Mel has a lot of these hints so don't go away.
