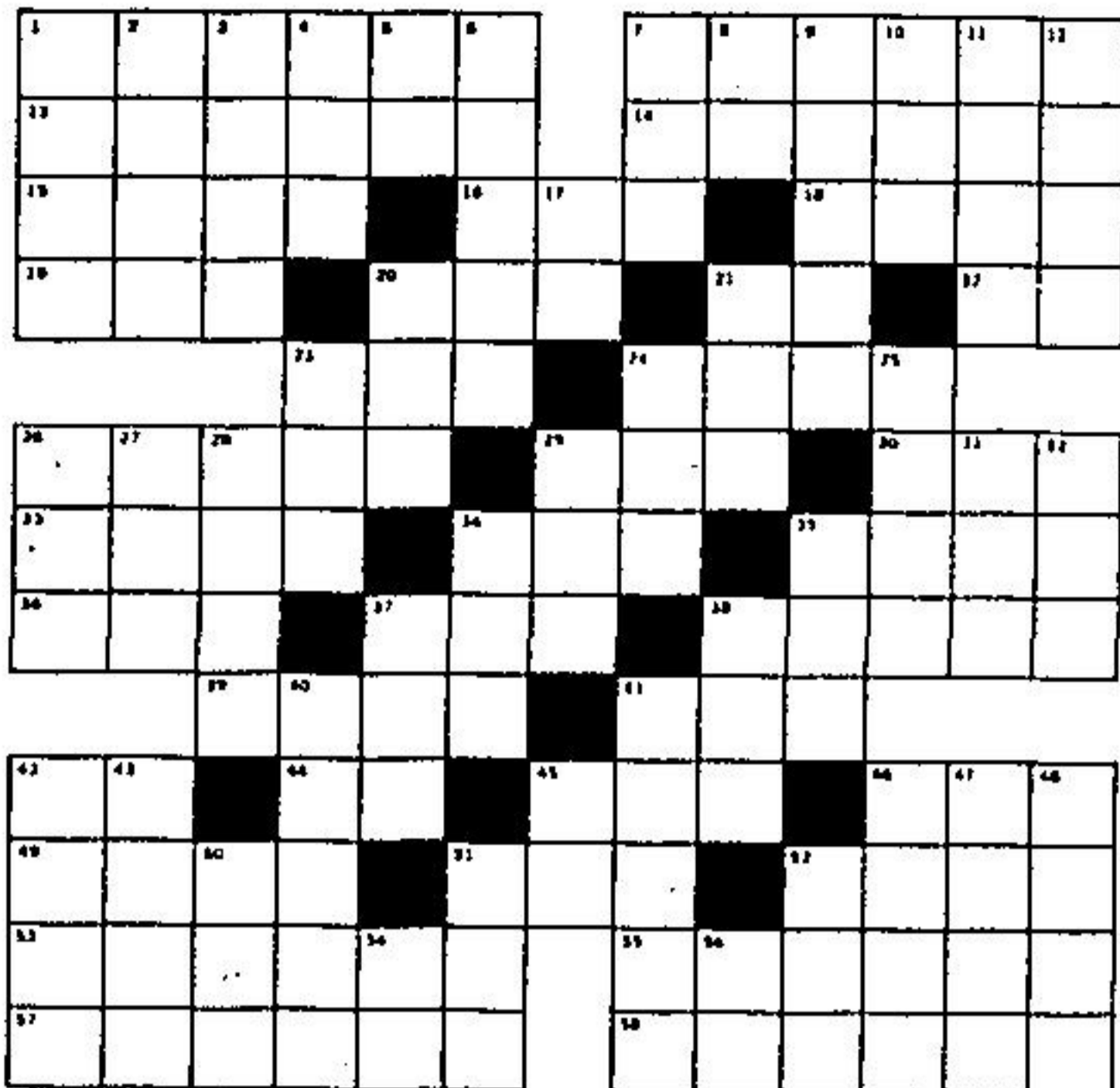

Fuel Squandered When Ignition System Fails To Function Well

Any defect in the ignition system is likely to create misfire and a resulting incomplete burning of the fuel. Thus raw gasoline will end up in the exhaust, both squandering fuel and creating pollution.

The role of the ignition system is to convert about 10 volts of primary current from the battery to upwards of 25,000 volts at the spark plug firing end. Any defect in this system producing less voltage is apt to create a misfire.

Common defects that can lead to misfire include worn out or fouled spark plugs, deteriorated plug cables or boots, distributor or coil malfunctions.

If any of these components aren't working right, it is possible that the electrical charge provided won't be sufficient to fire one or more spark plugs. The air-fuel mixture will not be ignited in affected cylinders. So, not only will gas be wasted in non-firing cylinders, but you need to compensate for loss of power by feeding more gas to the functioning cylinders.

If there is a general deterioration of the ignition system, the engine won't start at all (with a resultant waste of fuel trying to start the engine).

Do Safety Belts Save Lives ?

Many myths have been built up over the years concerning safety belt usage. Here are the facts:

As much as 40 per cent of the deaths in automobile crashes could be prevented if all drivers and passengers wore lap safety belts, 53 per cent of such deaths could be prevented by the use of a combination lap and shoulder belt.

1. FICTION: Safety belts are useful when travelling at high speed on the highway but are unnecessary nuisance when driving around town.

FACT: Half of all traffic deaths occur within 25 miles of the victims' home and at speeds of 40 miles per hour or less.

2. FICTION: Your chances of survival are better if you are thrown clear of a car in a crash.

FACT: The odds of surviving a crash are five times better if you stay inside the car.

3. FICTION: Safety belts prevent escape if your car catches on fire or goes under water.

FACT: Fire and submersion are a factor in less than one per cent of injury producing accidents. Even then, the protection from injury provided by safety belts increases your chances of escaping. It takes less than a second to release a belt.

4. FICTION: Good drivers do not need safety belts because their chances of being in an accident are slim.

FACT: One out of every two people living today will be involved in a crippling or fatal car accident.

5. FICTION: Safety belts are not suitable for children.

FACT: Children weighing 40 lbs. or more should always use a safety belt. Children weighing under 40 lbs. should be restrained in a child's safety seat approved by Consumer & Corporate Affairs.

6. FACT: In an emergency situation, safety belts keep passengers in their seats and enable the driver to stay where he belongs - behind the wheel to better control his vehicle.

7. FACT: Lap safety belts should be worn snugly over the hip bones, not the abdomen. This applies to pregnant women as well.

8. FACT: Shoulder belts should be slightly slack - a hand width out from chest. Shoulder belts should never be worn without the lap belt.

9. FACT: Rear seat safety belts are just as important as those in the front not only to protect rear seat passengers but to keep them from being catapulted into the front seat occupants.
