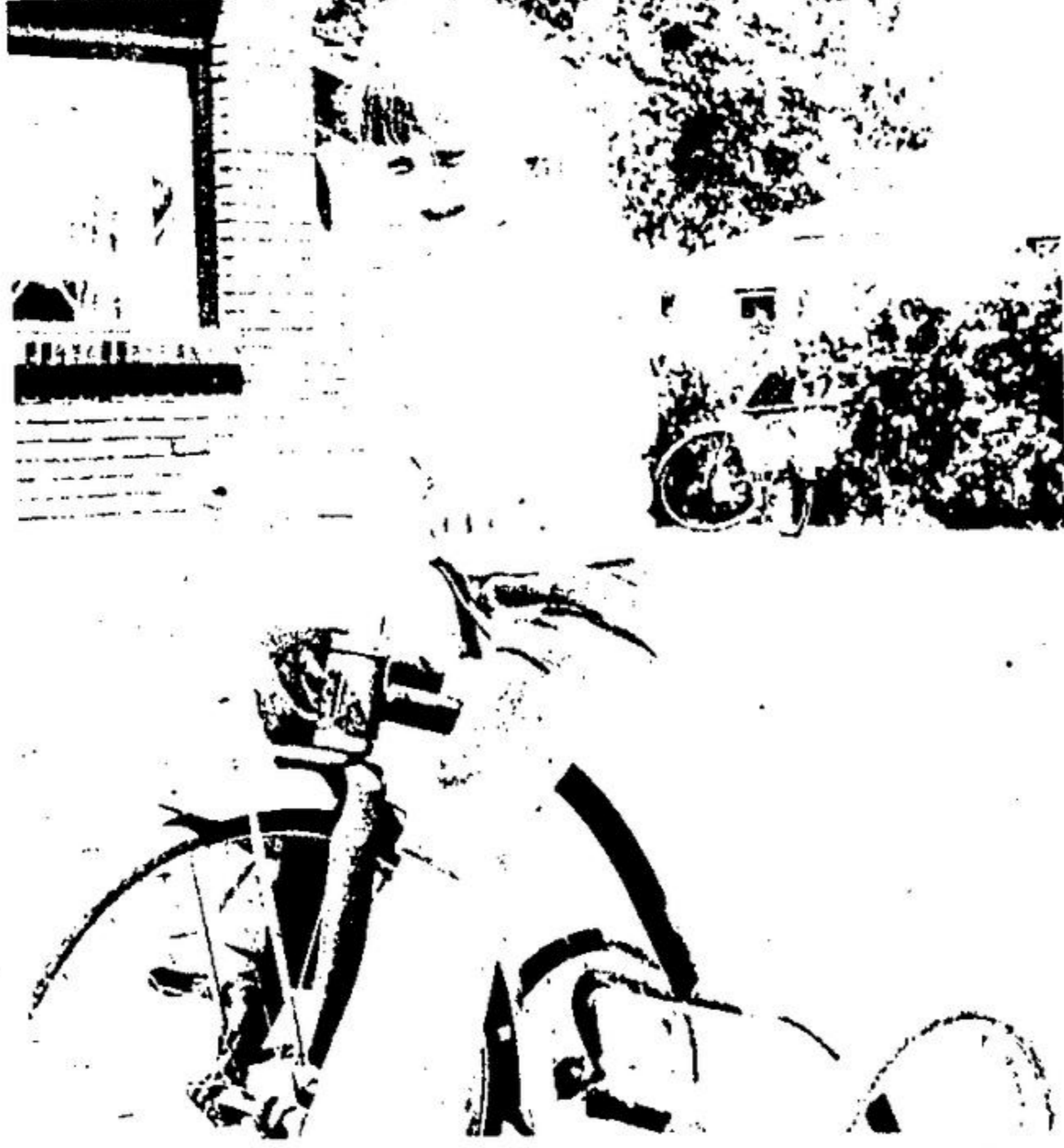


THANK HEAVENS FOR LITTLE GIRLS
