ONTARIO OUTDOORS

Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters has a Big Fish Contest this year as it has had for several years now. This contest is sponsored by a brewing company and prizes are given for fish in the following categories: rainbow trout, brook trout, lake trout or splake, walleye, northern pike, largemouth bass, smallmouth bass, and musky (maskinonge).

Entry forms are available in stores that sell tackle, and these forms when submitted must have a clear side view of the fish. Scale samples are also requested, if possible, and these are sent to the ministry of natural resources for study. There are. prizes totaling \$3,200, with prizes for the biggest fish in each category, and several other prizes.

Try Mountsberg Wildlife Centre. There is plenty for the family and the fishing is good for bass, largemouth, that is. You can also catch a nice feed of catfish, and this is good fish for the kids to try for as they are so easy to catch. Mountsberg is just south of Highway 401 past Campbellville.

WHAT'S IN OUR PARKS Continuing information of the parks within easy reach of Georgetown, McRae Point Provincial Park is situated on Lake Simcoe, 10 miles southeast of Orillia, reached from Highway 12. Camping and day use are available, and McRae Point Park is

enclosed on three sides by Lake Simcoe, thus providing extensive beach areas. Hydro sites are available for campers, and there is a boardwalk with various lookout points through a swamp which travels to the far shore of Lake Simcoe and loops back along shoreline.

WASAGA BEACH This park lies along the eastern shore of Nottawasaga Bay off Georgian Bay. It can be reached from Highway 400 by taking Highway 27 to 25 or 92. Daytime facilities only are provided at Wasaga Beach Park, but the 10 miles of sandy beach is popular with swimmers and sunbathers. Fishing is available in the Nottawasaga River in the early morning, or in the evening, and during the day, despite water skiers.

BIG SALMON Abel Frankruyter of Georgetown caught an eight-pound salmon while in Victoria B.C., recently. Abel and his family also saw wolf, moose, deer, mountain goat and sheep. This is a beautiful place for seeing animals, and there is scenery.

DUFFERIN DEER

The ministry of natural resources has announced that a bow season on deer is planned for the fall of 1974 in Dufferin County. From the swamps of Amaranth to the rolling hills of Mono and Mulmur, this county has long been known to support substantial deer numbers and thus will quite easily tolerate this limited form of harvest. The growing appeal of country living has resulted in much of the farmland in this area reverting to the "country retreat" type of property. This has provided excellent habitat for white-tailed deer.

Other areas of Ontario have had bow season for several years during which time bow hunting has been proven to be safe, satisfying and inexpensive form of recreation which is compatible even in heavily built up rural areas.

Initial participation in a bow season is expected to be low because there are few Ontarions skilled in this ancient pursuit. As well, wildlife managers within the ministry predict a harvest of fewer than one deer per 100 hunters. The main objective of this season is to provide the opportunity for more outdoor recreation. .To participate in an archery season, the bowhunter must hold a valid Ontario licence for deer. Bowhunting is legal on Sunday and archers have the added advantage of being able to practise in

their own backyards. The appeal of hunting with bow and arrow lies in the preparation required before the open season and the actual hunt itself, rather than in putting venison on the table. Those who tack true sportsmanlike spirit quickly lose interest in an activity that requires so many hours of preparation and practice for such a slight chance of success. The satisfaction comes from being outdoors, gaining skill in the necessary techniques and achieving a better understanding of our natural surroundings.
