SOME MORE TIPS from Mel on the restoration of your furniture include the use of liquid beeswax, which can be obtained at Mel's, to bring out the color of the wood. The first thing that you must remember when refinishing furniture is to do all the repairs first. When you have glued to do make sure that you use rope clamps. An object that is to serve a functional purpose should have a varnished finish but it is not necessary for an ornamental object. In this case a good paste wax will suffice. When buying brushes to apply these finishes, if you can find and half inch ones. Buy the cheapest ones that you can find and then throw them away when you are finished. The book to buy that will tell you all you need to know about restoring furniture is "Furniture Doctor" by George Grob.
