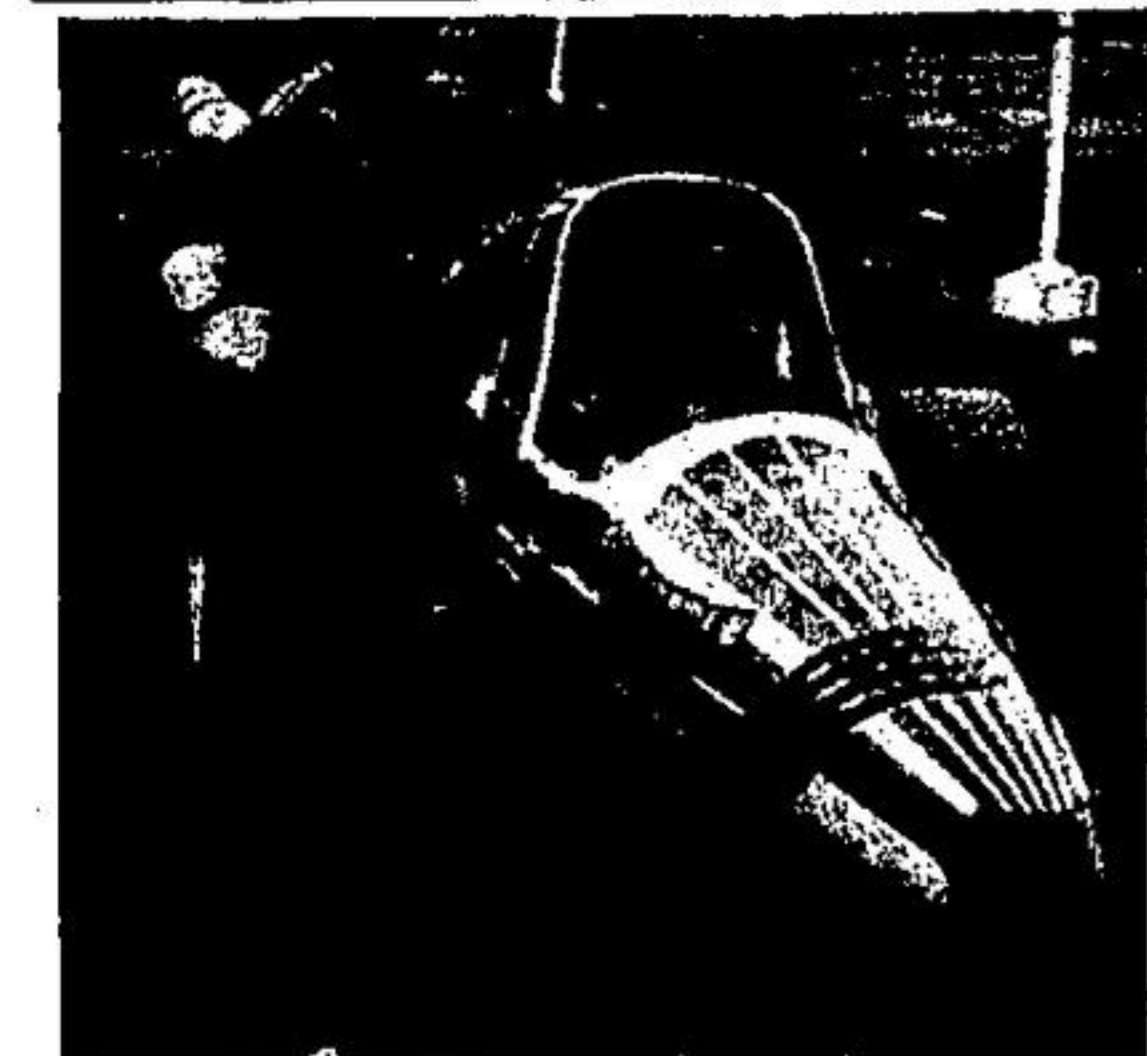


SPORTS AROUND TOWN

Drag Racing Spectacular

To the uninitiated, drag racing must seem like a very strange sport. It's barely evolved from the stop-light grand prix in as much as all the driver does is put his foot on the gas and hope for the best.

Yet drag racing is one of the most popular sports in North America; no mean feat since it has been snubbed by just about every racing authority in existence, and still hardly ever gets reported by the national press.

As everyone knows, who has seen American Graffiti, or who owned a car in the early 1950's drag racing began in the U.S. with a generation of kids who had nothing better to do than mess around with cars. If I was a sociologist I could tell you why it started, but I'm not.

All I know is that on Saturday night, at the Toronto International Dragway on Highway 7, kids from all over Halton Hills were burned, blinded and deafened by five 'jet cars' competing against themselves.

These cars are extraordinary creations. Basically, they are airplanes without wings. The drivers, or pilots, sit in front, and direct these cars down the quarter mile strip. At the end the cars are slowed down by parachutes.

It's all very dramatic to watch, especially when the cars rev-up their engines (or whatever you do with a jet engine) and the Toronto International Dragway, like all motor sport venues the world over, has its own unique atmosphere. The sheer power of the machines is overwhelming, and the speeds they reach are hard to comprehend.

Unlike most sports, drag racing can be appreciated by those who know very little about the finer points of competition. It is, perhaps, in the traditional North American way, best described as a spectacle sport.

And the best way to appreciate just what I mean is to pay a visit to the strip on Highway 7 any Wednesday or Friday evening.

Face-Lift For Bowling Arena

Work was started last Thursday at Georgetown Bowl. There are no bowlers at the alley but the lanes are by no means empty.

Georgetown Bowl is taking out the old Brunswick automatic pin setters and replacing them with newer ones. In fact the new pin setters are the latest, most sophisticated model. They are smaller, safer and more trouble free than the older model. This will result in faster, easier bowling as well as more room behind the machines for servicing.

Georgetown Bowl has been open since 1961 and since then this is the first time that updating of equipment has been undertaken. Next year the building that houses the Georgetown Bowl will be added to and eight more lanes will be available to bowlers. These new lanes will have the same type of pin setting equipment now being installed in the existing part.

Georgetown Bowl which is owned by W.A. Radyk, handles about 1,000 public and YBC league bowlers per week. Julie Burns is champion in league bowling and will be travelling

to Ottawa in September to compete in the National Championship. Because of their good performance the teams from the Georgetown Bowl are well known provincially.

Ontario believes that residents 65 or over, the blind and the disabled should have an income of at least \$2600 a year.

In July, Ontario will introduce a Special Benefits program. It will place extra funds on top of federal Guaranteed Income Supplements—enough to guarantee the elderly who are qualified residents of Ontario an income of \$2600 a year. Blind and disabled people who qualify for Family Benefits will also be entitled to these special benefits.

Beginning September 1, approved drugs prescribed by a doctor or dentist will be available, free of charge, to those qualifying for the special benefits outlined above, Family Benefits or the federal Guaranteed Income Supplement. Drug cards will be mailed automatically. You don't have to apply for them.

Who will receive these special benefits?

If you are 65 or over (with an annual income of less than \$2600)...and you now receive both Old Age Security and the Guaranteed Income Supplement... you will receive your benefits cheque each month, automatically. You do not have to apply for it.

If you are 65 or over (with an annual income of less than \$2600)...and you do not receive any federal income supplement... please give us a call. Our telephone number is shown below.

If you are blind or disabled... and you now receive assistance under Ontario's Family Benefit Program... you will receive your benefits cheque each month, automatically. You do not have to apply for it.

If you are blind or disabled... and you do not receive Provincial assistance... please give us a call. Our telephone number is shown below.
