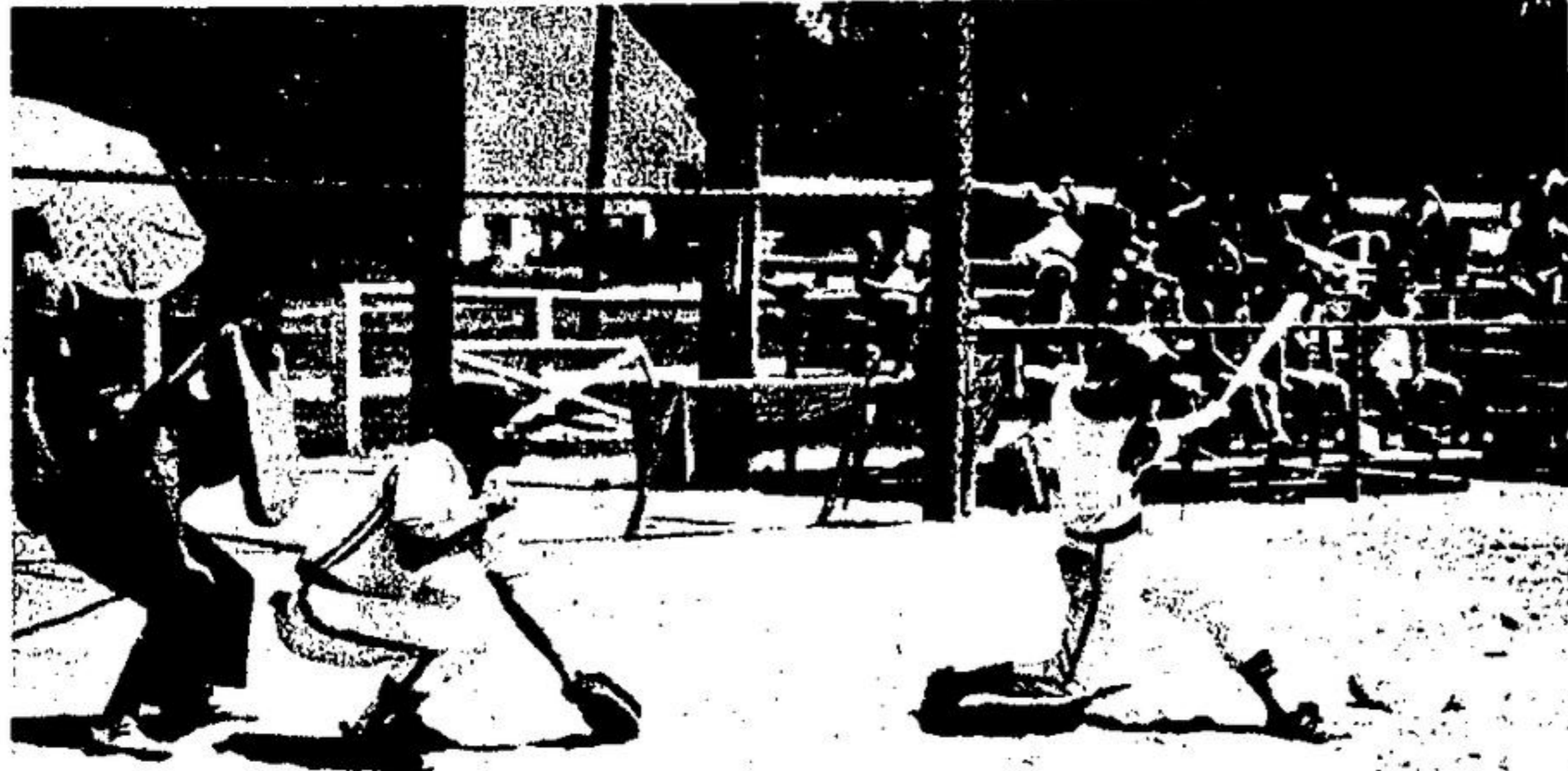


Armbro Tykes Strike Gold Against Milton, Oakville

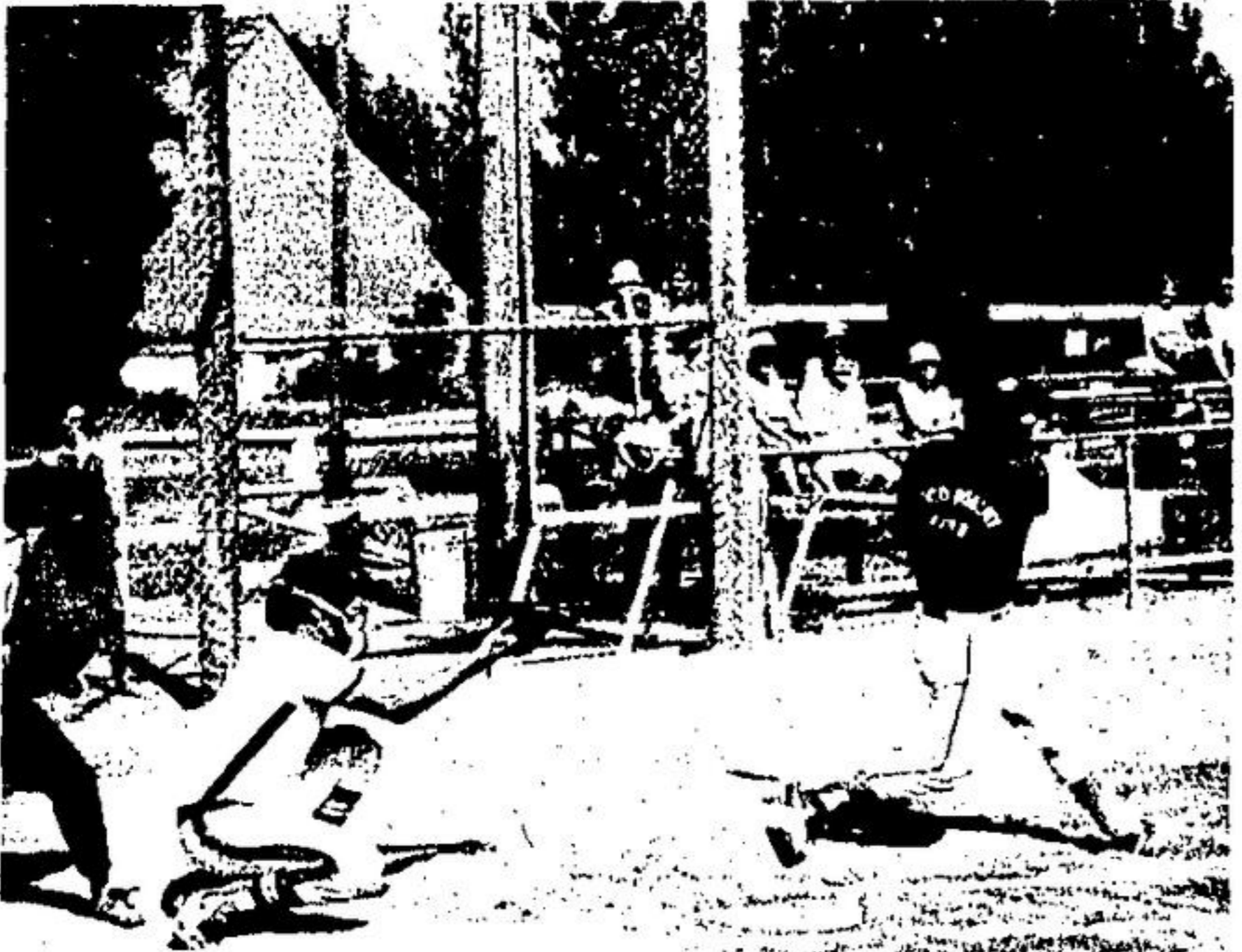
