Fresh from the Steel City Tournament, Oakville Midgets were in the opposition against the Lions last Tuesday in a tight 5-4 game.

Oakville started fast, getting four runs off starter Bob Freestone in three innings. They added the winner in the fourth before Georgetown started to move. Bill Allison got things rolling with a triple, Hal Hulme walked, Sam Caruso singled one run home and Dale Richmond beat out an infield hit. Doug Barnes brought all three runs across the plate with a well hit triple.

Bad luck and lack of baseball discipline hurt in the fifth when Ged Williams opened with a double. Denmore was unable to put a bunt down and Williams got hit by the ball on the hit and run. Bill Allison got picked off stealing home to end the Leo's rally.

They outhit Oakville seven to three so hitting is not the problem and four of the five Oakville runs were free passes. Mike McCandless in relief got stung with the loss.

Thursday night the sun shone and the Lions finally got in their scheduled game with Erindale. Sam Caruso was the hero of the night by smacking not one but two home runs over the fence. Georgetown started real quick getting four runs in the first inning. Hal Hulme singled, Gerald Williams reached first on an error then Mike McCandless singled home one run.

'Spiel Group' To Handle Labour Problems

Any questions or problems anyone may have about working in Ontario, can be answered by the Spiel Group, set up in Georgetown, in front of Manpower, July 23.

Spiel (Students Providing Information on Employment Rights to the Labor Force) has been set up by the ministry of labor as part of its community out-reach program to provide employees and employers with information about the laws and the services of the ministry. Initiated last year by the Ontario youth secretariat, Spiel travels to areas away from the various district offices, to arrange seminars, lectures, displays and coverage by the community media. This year's teams operate from nine different centres across the province.

The teams have found that many persons are unaware of current legislation and the proposed changes announced recently in the minimum wage and other working standards.

Another area of interest is the Human Rights Code, which deals in the discrimination in work, housing and public accommodation. The women's bureau, a part of the human rights commission, specifically deals in the problems encountered by Ontario women who are in, or about to enter, the labor force. Safety laws and precautions while working in construction and industry and information on workmen's compensation in the event of injury, are also highlighted.
