Brampton Air Show This Week-End

The Brampton air show is a little more personal according to the organizers of the Brampton flying club's fifth annual air show.

Roy Sage a member of the club, pointed out that most of the planes will land and take-off within a few hundred feet of the spectators, while parachutists will try to land in front of the onlookers.

"We like to think that our all-Canadian air show is a little more personal than the international show at the CNE. The average crowd for the last four years is about 6,000 to 10,000," he added.

The show is scheduled for Sunday, July 28, at 1.30 p.m. at the Brampton airport, eight miles north of Brampton on Highway 10 west of the village of Victoria.

"This year should be better than ever, with new aerobatics teams and displays. Heading the show will be the special 'red cap' team which features five pilots using Pitts specials, aerobatic planes," Mr. Sage said.

Also scheduled for the show are hot air balloons, a display of aerobatics by a glider, and a number of World War I and II fighter planes. "We'll have a dog fight featuring a World War I Fokker, De Havilland D-7, N-24 and a SE5A," he explained.

"There will be a fly-by of all the planes, including a Corsair fighter from World War II, as well as a Fairy Fire Fly, a larger cousin of the Spitfire," Mr. Sage continued. "The master of ceremonies is Bill McVean of CFRB."

A number of homebuilt airplanes will be included in the fly-by. A Volksplane, which is powered by a Volkswagen engine and "Breezy," which is "nothing more than a wicker basket under a wing" are highlighted. "For the smallest plane in the show, I think the pilot needs a shoehorn to get in it," Mr. Sage quipped.

During the midbreak in the show, the Seneca Princes drum and bugle corps band will play. The group of 93 young people sponsored by Seneca College will perform a medley of Russian songs.

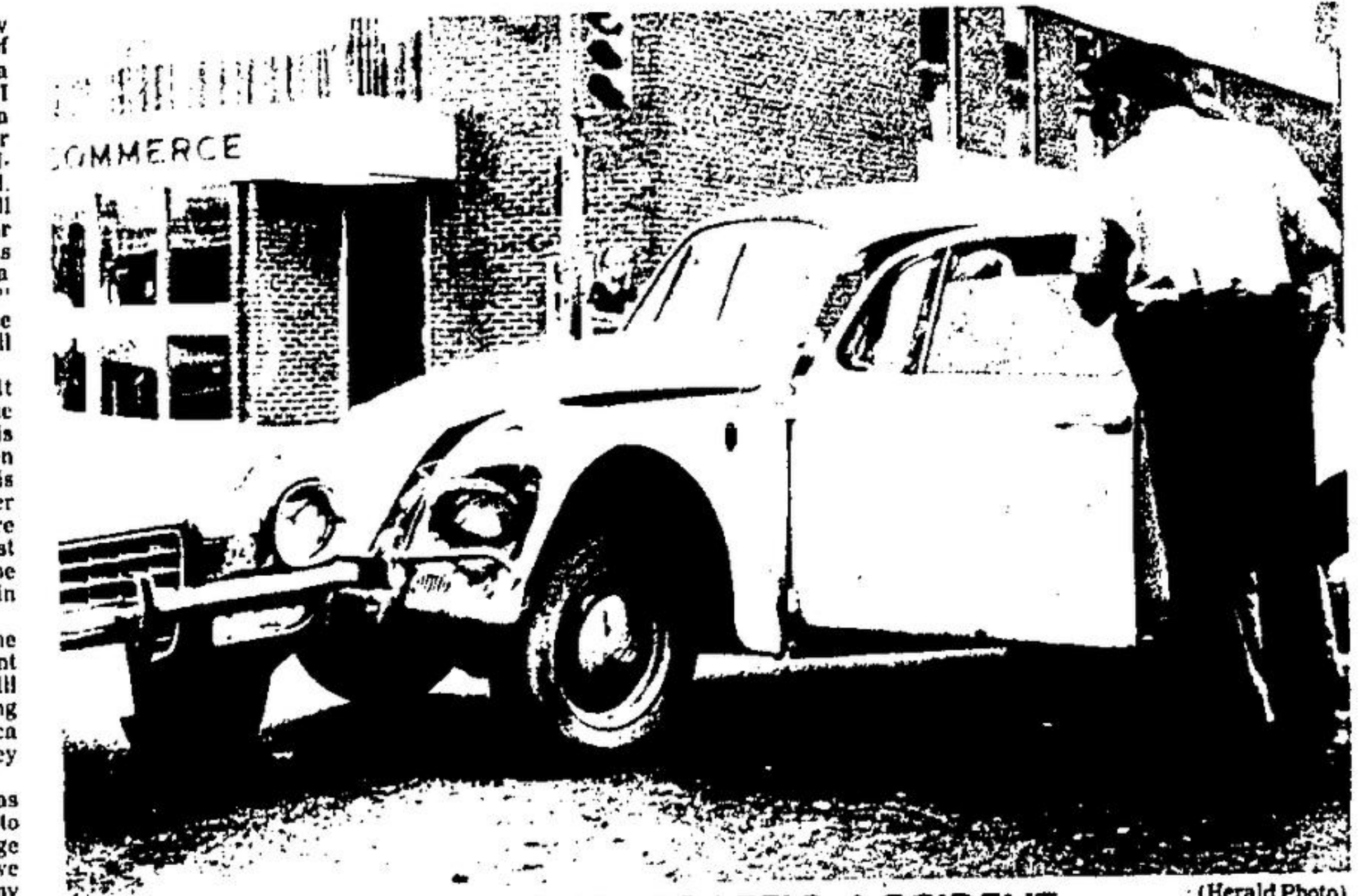

Costly Delays Plague Cable Television

A delay in announcing a decision of future expansion of Georgetown Cable Television Limited may be costly to the company according to Arthur J. Jamieson, president and general manager.

The Canadian Radio and Television Commission which is the licensing body reached their decision based on the results of public hearings held last March in Ottawa. Prior to the meetings cost figures for equipment and construction were gathered and budgets set.

However, construction costs have continued to rise while the cable television company awaits the public announcement by the CRTC. "We had hoped to be able to offer the residents of Acton, Milton and Georgetown improved reception and thirty channel service by the end of this year," said Mr. Jamieson this week.

The cable company had applied for an amendment to the existing licence to expand their facilities. Included in the amendment were plans to increase its area of service from Georgetown to Acton and Milton.

Also the company wishes to offer subscribers an extended channel capacity of up to 30 channels as compared to 12 of the present system. In addition they wish to relocate the tower.

"We don't expect our subscribers to be satisfied with the limitations of our present system forever," said Mr. Jamieson.

The new cable system would offer several advantages over the present one. It would be handling: WGR Ch. 2, Global Communications, Ch. 6, WBN Ch. 4, CBLT Ch. 5, CITY Ch. 79, CFTO Ch. 9, CICA Ch. 19, CHCH Ch. 11, WKWB Ch. 7, CKCO Ch. 13 and on the optional service WUTV Ch. 29, WNEC Ch. 17, CKVR Ch. 3, CPPL Ch. 10 (London).

"These extra channels will be available with the use of auxiliary tuners (set-top converters) leased and maintained by the company for an additional monthly fee," continued Mr. Jamieson.

Already a subdivision in Acton is being outfitted for cable television under an agreement with the developer. John Goy who is the other applicant for cable television in the town is sharing the costs of installation and the cable itself in order to minimize expenses while construction is underway.

The company president pointed out that experiments are underway into the feasibility of using a microwave relay system to bring in the major American networks, WGR, WBN, WKWB and WUTV with better quality.

Interference caused by CKCO's rebroadcast station channel 2 Georgian Bay, causes a complete loss of the WGR signal on many cable systems in southwestern Ontario.

"In the first five years of operation construction and equipment to bring the expanded capacity system to the 11,000 households in Acton, Milton, Georgetown, Glen Williams and Norval will cost over \$1.5 million.

Mr. Jamieson added, "That once the announcement by the CRTC is made public and if favorable, construction could be completed within six to eight months.

Large Field To Attend C.P.G.A. Tournament

The Senior Canadian Professional Golfers Association Championship, to be played at the Galt Country Club, Cambridge Aug. 16-18, will have the largest field ever to compete for the Spalding Trophy.

At entry deadline, Dave Zink, executive director of the CPGA announced that 56 entries had been received for the 54-hole national championship sponsored by A.G. Spalding & Bros. of Canada Limited for total prize money of \$11,500.

"This is absolutely the best senior field ever assembled in Canada," Zink said, "and we're even more pleased by the scope of entries, because we have players from the Maritimes to British Columbia."

"Top-notch seniors like Stan Leonard, Dick Borthwick, Gordon DeLaat, defending champion Bill Kozak, Charles Girardeau, Henry Martell and Murray Tucker form a pretty competitive field. It should be a real test at Galt because the course demands accuracy and finesse to score well."

Totaled, the Spalding Senior CPGA field accounts for 22 CPGA championships with Leonard leading with eight and Stan Home and Jules Huot tied for second with three.

The senior championship, is combined with a celebrity field featuring personalities like former Ottawa Rough Riders quarter-back Tuss Jackson, New York Rangers centre Jean Belisle and Canadian Football League Commissioner Jake Gaudaur.

In this popular, but slightly unusual best-ball competition, a professional plays with a different celebrity each of the three days, with all players keeping an accumulative, individual best-ball score. Both Tucker and Borthwick, best-ball co-champions at 14 Golf Club, will defend their share of the title at Galt.
