

Mormon Businessman Is Mission President

Russ Ballard, a Salt Lake City businessman, has been named the new president of the Canada Toronto Mission, formerly the Ontario Mission, of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon). This new assignment brought President Ballard and his family to Ontario in July. He succeeds President Roy R. Spackman, who has directed the mission for the past three years. Dr. Spackman has returned to resume his medical practice in Cardston, Alberta. As the president of the Canada Toronto Mission, Mr. Ballard will direct the affairs of the Mormon Church throughout most of Ontario. Principally under his direction will be the 180 young men and women who serve as full time missionaries in the province. The new president is owner of Ballard and Company and partner in Ballard-Wade Inc. He has left these real estate and automotive concerns under the management of his associates. "Hopefully they will still be profitable firms when we return," he said.

Mr. Ballard was a missionary in England, has twice served as bishop of a ward, or local congregation, and has been a member of the High Council in two stakes, or regional organizations, similar to a diocese. One of the questions frequently asked the Ballards is why—why would anyone leave their home, friends, and jobs in Salt Lake City and come to lead the Church in Ontario. Water Shut-Off Freak Accident
According to town engineer Peter Morris, a five and one half hour water shut off to a majority of Acton residents was a freak situation and should never happen again.

Mr. Morris explained in a telephone conversation that the combination of two valves in the Acton water system caused the problem on August 3 at about 5:00 p.m.

"Somebody, we don't know exactly who, shut off a valve on Mill St. and later when a main broke on Church St. another valve was shut and the combination turned off the water to most of the town," he explained.

The engineer added that he was not positive about who shut off the Mill St. valve, but noted that it was not any of the town's employees and probably not anyone from the region.

Mr. Morris pointed out that the underground valve could have been shut off for a couple of weeks without anyone realizing it.

Canadian Ego Exhibition Is At Georgetown Arcade

Exhibiting at the Georgetown Arcade this Monday at 9:15 o'clock till 11 o'clock, will be the Johnny Canuck Canadian Ego Exhibition.

Canada's smallest, most complete world touring exhibition of 68 unique Ontario art works by 16 contemporary artists previewing here before its October, 1974 European opening in Paris, France; Brussels, Belgium; and London, England.

The miniatures will be exhibited for a brief period of time during the next few weeks in each city in Ontario having a name comparable to a foreign capital city throughout the world and will be accompanied by many of the exhibiting artists organizers who estimate the shows total value at over \$6,000.

The Ontario touring funds are provided by the Ontario Arts Council, The Art Gallery of Ontario and the Niagara Artists' Co-op while the European exhibition is financed by the Centre Culturel du Canadien, Ambassade du Canada.

The 'Miniature Show' was conceived by its artist as a method of bringing an uncompromised cross-section of controversial art works as a complete unit (38 x 10" x 25") to the public in a way convenient to all.

Some of the works entail beautifully detailed paintings, finely crafted carvings and highly polished, machined metal work with counter themes including crudely devised found art, e.g., rubber doll heads and a broken cigar.

The fascinating titles include 'Stud', Hand Held Portrait of Wilf Carter, Chess Set (36 pieces on a one inch board) and We Were The First to Bomb Berlin.

Audiences should regard this exhibition as an opportunity to see works which may never again be seen in this country.

"Although the show started as a light hearted venture organised by artists, it developed over a period of time into a serious endeavour as the calibre of artists participating in the show surpassed our expectations and produced an exciting, credible unit," said

co-ordinator Ray Woodworth, Treasurer, Mike Hewko. He explains that each artist originally contributed \$25 to offset production costs and they hope to be refunded through exhibition rental fees and the non-commission sale of their works with prices ranging from \$2.90 to \$250.

No Bids Given For Region Job
