The Canadian Forestry Service recorded 2,091 forest fires in Canada during the month of July, affecting some

The figures are compared with a total of 1,712 fires in the corresponding period last year, over a total acreage of

These figures bring the season's total of 5,075 fires affecting 1,624,000 acres, compared with 5,087 fires and 2,064,000 acres for the same

period in 1973.

Average figures for the month of July during the past decade are 1,781 fires and 705,000 acres.

These statistics are compiled monthly by the Forest Fire Research Institute of the Canadian Forestry Service.
