2,091 Forest Fires In Canada During July

The Canadian Forestry Service recorded 2,091 forest fires in Canada during the month of July, affecting some

1,442,000 acres of the country's forest land. The figures are compared with a total of 1,712 fires in the corresponding period last year, over a total acreage of 1,867,000.

These figures bring the season's total of 8,075 fires affecting 1,624,000 acres, compared with 5,087 fires and 2,064,000 acres for the same period in 1973.
