

Julie Burns of Georgetown Tested In National Playoff

The 10th annual National Youth Bowling Championships came to a close last Wednesday, after four days of keen competition, excitement, fun and frustration.

Georgetown's girl, Julie Burns, who caught the hearts of everyone when she captured the Bantam Girls Singles Provincial crown last March, found herself up against some real sharpshooters last week. Her final tally was 11 wins and 13 losses, to place with the fifth best record among the nine girls.

Julie averaged a very respectable 185 over her 24 games but the breaks just didn't come her way. Three of the first four girls who bowled against Julie came up with games over the 300 mark. After the first two days she had a record of four wins and eight losses.

The third day was Julie's day, however, as she won seven of nine games to pull up into a three way tie for fourth place, only one point down from third place. The third day, she was defeated in all three games, even though two of these were over 200 singles. She ended up in fifth.

Girls competing in Julie's event were Shari Meier of Prince George B.C.; Chris Ahronson of Edmonton, Alta.; Brenda McKelvie of Estevan, Sask.; Cindy Crabbe of Neepawa, Man.; Heather Smith of Manitowadge, Northern Ont.; Christine Danis of Gatineau, Que.; Tina Lawrence of Oromocio, New Brunswick and Barbara Redmond of St. John's, Nfld.

The following is a record of the matches in which Julie bowled. Scores are for three games.

As is clearly seen, four of the girls shot close to or over 230 averages against Julie. Georgetown should be very proud of this young lady on her fine effort and showing.

By the second day of competition, all nine girls in the Bantam Girls Singles event had become great friends - even Christine Danis of Quebec who could neither speak nor understand a word of English except "Good luck" and "thank-you". All of the girls cheered one another on in a manner which was beautiful to see. If it were not for the Provincial uniforms, one would have sworn that they were all on the same team!

The standings after the 24 match play games showed the Northern Ontario winning the bronze medal. There was a tie, however, for first place between Chris Ahronson of Alberta and Christine Danis of Quebec. In a sudden-death playoff

game, the Alberta girl triumphed with a score of 192 to 184. She received the gold medal while the Quebec girl took the silver.

BEST FRIEND
Probably the best friend that Julie made in Ottawa was Mrs. Flo Todd, zone representative for the Ontario zone of York West, and unofficially known as "den mother of the YBC". Throughout the championships, Mrs. Todd cheered all the girls on and comforted them in times of frustration.

BUSY SCHEDULE
There was never a dull moment for the 266 participating youngsters as they visited the National Aeronautics Building on Sunday, dined and were entertained at a dinner in Pointe Gatineau, Quebec on Monday, enjoyed the National Museum of Science and Technology on Tuesday, and toured the Parliament Buildings, the

National Arts Centre and the War Museum on Wednesday.

VICTORY BANQUET
On Wednesday evening, the Ontario government sponsored the Victory Banquet at Ottawa Civic Centre. Mr. George Nixon, member of the Ontario Legislature for Dufferin was host. Also attending was the mayor of Ottawa. The main course of the dinner consisted of roast sirloin of beef, mashed potatoes, peas and carrots. Apple pie and ice cream were served for dessert.

Next on the agenda were the awards presentations. Teams and singles were summoned up to the victory platform by event to receive their gold, silver and bronze medals. The medal winners in each event were as follows. One point was awarded for each win, and half a point for a tie. Bantam and senior singles bowled 24 games while junior singles shot 27 games. All teams bowled 18 games.
