

Limehouse Public School Gets Modification Turn

Limehouse Public School has had a new addition built to the existing school that houses a new library, gymnasium, sick-room and staff-room.

The new addition cost a total of \$158,900 and is part of the Halton Board of Education's program to upgrade the public schools in the Halton region.

Each year, one school receives extensive modifications and in 1974 it was the turn of Limehouse.

Limehouse had no serious overcrowding problem in its classrooms. Eight classrooms accommodate 215 children, averaging less than 30 pupils per room.

The additions are intended to be used by the whole community, thus making Limehouse school a community centre. The library has been specially designed to stock adult books, and the gym is equipped for adult and pupil use.

The construction began last fall, and the finishing touches should be made by the end of September.

The new library is equipped with all the facilities expected of a modern high school. There is a full complement of both fiction and non-fiction books on the shelves.

One corner has been designated a "story book" corner and here kindergarten children will be able to sit around the teacher while listening to their favorite stories.

Another corner has five study desks, each one separated by a wall, that have electrical outlets so that the children can use slide projectors and cassette recorders.

Film projectors and record players are also available for the children. The use of cassettes and projectors is tied in with the children's curriculum.

The furniture was designed by Mr. Haley, Dave Simpson, a media consultant, Sharon Mosher, the part-time librarian and Harriet Mitchell, last year's librarian in co-operation with the architect. One unique feature is a "book drop" in the main hall which allows children to return books when the library is closed.

A hatch connects the hall with the library. At present, the library is open every afternoon and Friday morning, but Mr. Haley hopes to have it in use during the whole day before too long.

If and when the library is open to the community, another librarian will come in after school hours.

Classes started using the library on September 3. The whole design lay-out is hoped to encourage pupils to get

together and learn from each other. There is room for the children to talk about what they have learned from the various pieces of equipment.

The new gymnasium has markings on the floor for shuffleboard, volleyball, badminton, and basketball. There is a trampoline and a climbing apparatus called an Adidas set. This consists of a frame with various interlocking pieces that can be used in many different structures. In addition there is a similar, but much larger set for the older children.

Ropes will be strung across corners of the gym and a rigging, similar to the rigging on sailing ships, will soon be used. The gym has only been used a few times and most of the equipment has yet to be tested properly.

The nurses' room, or sick-room has a single bed, that used to be, like the library, in the hall. A trained nurse works part-time and also helps pupils in Grades two, three and four who have problems learning.

The nurse helps each pupil individually with special books designed to give the child a greater interest in reading.

The new staff-room is much larger than the old one which has now become a work area for teachers, with duplicating machines and type-writers.

Halton Liberals Held Meeting

President, Murray Haesler of Oakville, a lawyer and former town councillor. Executive vice president, Frank Allen of Glen Williams (a contestant for the party's recent federal nomination which was won by Dr. Frank Philbrook). Vice

presidents, Alice Walker of Georgetown and Judy Savage of Oakville. Secretary, Joyce Fairley of Oakville. Treasurer, Terry Campbell of Oakville (whose father was Premier of Manitoba some years ago).

Elizabeth Robson, immediate past president of the Halton and Halton East Liberal Association, will be a member of both the federal and provincial riding associations as past president. Liberal MP Dr. Frank Philbrook is also a member of both associations.

Province Helps Firm With \$50,000 To Frustrate Abuse of Boss' Phone

A Georgetown firm has received a \$50,000 loan from the Province of Ontario to help frustrate people using the boss' phone for personal long distance calls.

A new "toll restrictor" to be manufactured by Pamco Electronics of Georgetown will go into production later this year.

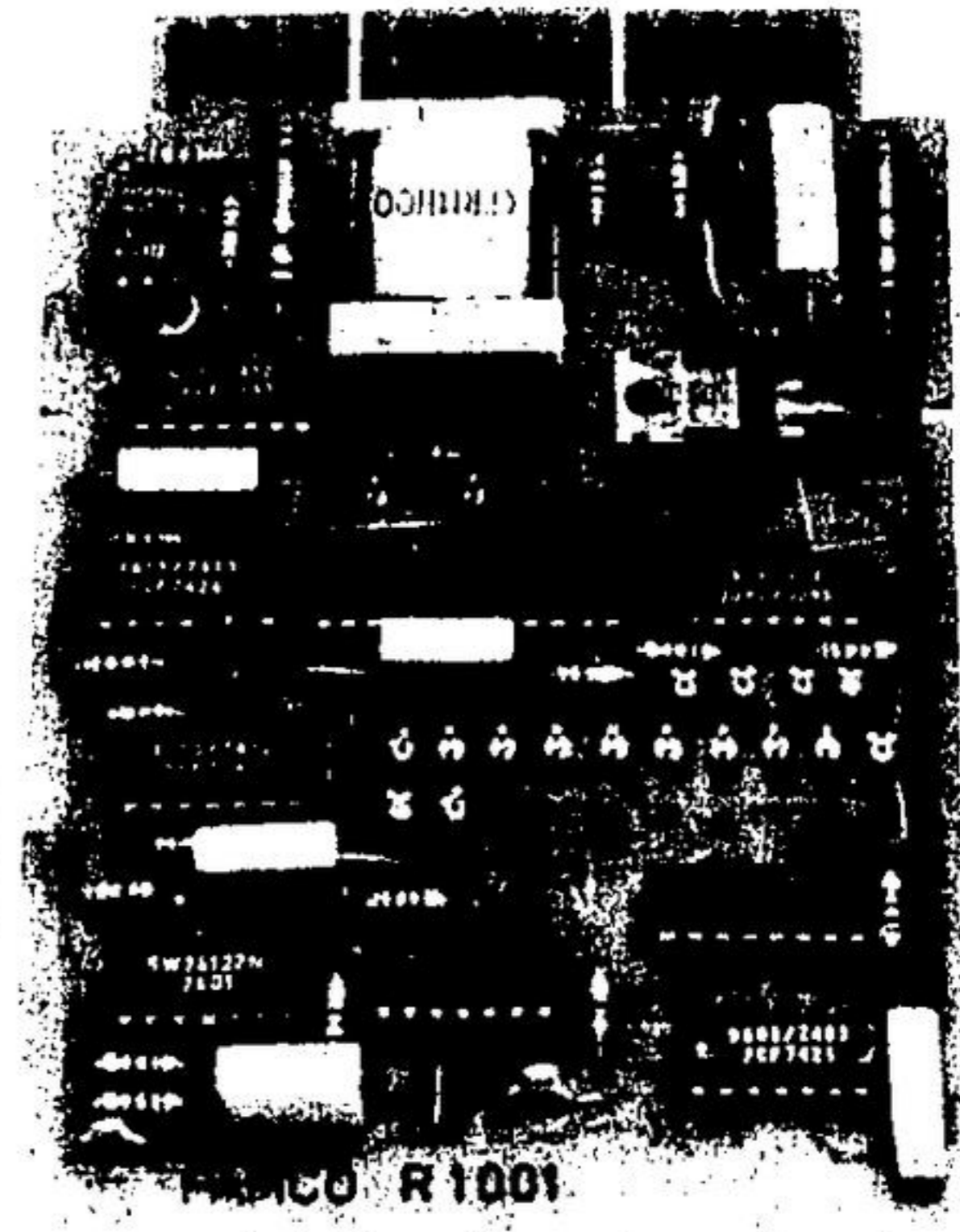
"This product is one of a family of telephone devices to be introduced in later months," said Peter McLean, president and general manager of Pamco Electronics Incorporated.

The newly formed company has been awarded a venture capital loan of \$50,000 to increase production of its unique "Toll Restrictor."

The toll restrictor has been engineered to overcome long-distance abuses by unauthorized personnel of business telephones. Research and development for the restrictor took two years, according to McLean.

The unit will be assembled in Georgetown with the electronic components made by various Ontario industries. The device employs the latest in electronic technology to reduce the size, weight and cost to permit large scale production.

Integrated circuits help lessen the size and complexity



The units are programmed to act upon any dialed number. Rather than cut off the line

after dialing a one or zero it is possible by altering the wiring to terminate any number dial. Calls can also be redirected with the device to a central switchboard or other phones for long distance control.

The unit has been field tested across Canada and has been built to conform with all industry standards both here and in Europe, says McLean.

McLean has 12 years experience in the manufacture and design of telephone systems.

At present there is no such item available for on-premises control of long distance calls, he says. Bell has systems available with the control circuits located in the exchange office, out of the reach of the user who may wish to place toll calls.

By turning off the power the unit becomes passive and long distance calls as well as regular calls will be unaffected.

Pamco Electronics plan to add other products such as auto-dialers which will dial any pre-set telephone number at the touch of one button, answering devices, and touch tone converters to permit the use of touch tone phones to be used in non-electronic switching systems, such as in Georgetown.

It is planned to distribute these restrictors and related products through independent telephone system suppliers in Canada and the U.S.A. There are over 20 independent telephone companies in Ontario.

Pamco was incorporated in March of this year and plans by the end of the year to open a factory for assembling in Georgetown.

CRTC Cable Decision Under Fire

A recent decision by the Canadian Radio and Television Commission which granted approval for Georgetown Cable Television Limited to raise the monthly subscription rates has come under fire by the Canadian Broadcasting League.

This is the first time the CBL has filed an appeal of this sort with the Privy Council of Canada. The CBL hopes to test the right of the CRTC to keep confidential the financial information supplied by cable television applicants and operators.

The appeal, while mainly directed against the CRTC's decision regarding Georgetown Cable TV reflects on all cable companies, public or privately owned across Canada.

The executive director of the Canadian Broadcasting League, Colin A. Billows appeared at the March 74 public hearing in Ottawa to present an intervention accusing cable companies of unfair profits and practices. Mr. Billows charged that as cable is today, operating under the direction of the CRTC and Communications Canada it is a hindrance to broadcast television.

At present we have in industry with gross revenues of \$100 million (across Canada) contributing nothing to broadcast programming on which it relies so completely," noted Mr. Billows.

The CBL wishes to see any excess profits of cable operators put to use to improve the quality of broadcast programming and the public's ability to receive it.

Under CRTC ruling financial information is only to be kept confidential if this action is in the public interest.

Mr. Billows has now challenged the commission's decision because of failure to disclose this information.

The CBL accuses cable companies of hindering developments in television technology by limiting the use of channels through set-top converters available as an option.

By providing converters to all subscribers at increased cost there could be no theft of service through the use of privately owned converters. Manufacturers could then offer sets capable of tuning in these added channels. A few U.S. suppliers have dared to include these extended capacity tuners.

At present, use of unauthorized converters as well as extension outlets is a punishable offence under existing regulations.

Arthur J. Jamieson, president of Georgetown Cable Television indicated, "The appeal will only affect the section of the decision permitting the 50 cent per month rate increase, the expansion into Acton and Milton is continuing as planned."

The new rates have been made effective as of Sept. 1 as granted by the Canadian Radio and Television Commission. There has been no rate increase for the past six years and we feel, as the commission must have, the increase was
