**Townhouse Project Put To Planners For A Review**

A townhouse developer was almost denied a request for a zoning change, before the general administration committee agreed to allow the planner and planning advisory sub-committee review the plans.

A presentation was made by Bob Cliphaw for Craig Combe and John Murray, regarding land bordered by Dayfoot Drive and the C.N.R. tracks in town.

The 1.7 acres of land is presently zoned for low density residential, single family residential, but the developers want it changed to medium density for a 22-unit townhouse subdivision.

Mr. Cliphaw noted that the density of the development would be 12.5 townhouses per acre of land, and these would be staggered along the street for a varied look.

However, Coun. Ric Morrow pointed out that part of the property is used for a driveway which is not included as land used to find the density ratio.

Coun. Morrow added that he was not in favor of the project. "I don't like it period," he said. "I just don't like anything about it," he added. "If we have to do something, let's refer it to our next meeting and deal with it then. I can just see it causing too many problems."

However, Councillors Les Doby and Dick Howitt wanted to take a look at the property and refer it to the planner and planning advisory sub-committee until a future date.

Three residents of Dayfoot Drive attended the meeting, and told the councillors that they were not in favor of the project, primarily because of the increased traffic flow.

"I am objecting on the grounds of an increased volume of traffic," said John McDonald, of 4 Dayfoot Dr. "I'm not just talking about the laneway onto the property, but also, on the street, which is a dead-end."

During his proposal, Mr. Cliphaw also noted that a single family dwelling on Dayfoot Drive would be destroyed to make a laneway to the townhouses, from the street. An existing laneway is also available further down the street.

Bette Broomhead, of 14 Dayfoot, who lives beside the single family home destined to become dust added that she was objecting to the proposal. "There'll be a great deal more traffic and we do have the swimming pool right across the street from us," she added. "The whole thing seems very small, and the people'll be right in our backyards almost."

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**Minor Executive Agree On Timing**

The executive of the Georgetown and District Minor Hockey Association have agreed on the timing of each League's games during the coming season.

**Overcome With Fumes At Maple Lodge**

Ten ladies working at Maple Lodge Farms Ltd. in Norval, were taken to Peel Memorial Hospital, Friday morning as a result of a carbon dioxide leak at the plant.

The ladies were released at noon, and all were back at work Monday morning. Carbon dioxide is used at Maple Lodge for dry ice packaging of poultry. On Friday morning, at 10:30 a.m., an extraction fan used to distribute excess CO2 was turned off, or never turned on. As a result carbon dioxide built up, causing the ten ladies to feel sick. They were immediately taken to Peel Memorial Hospital but later released.

Mr. Bob May, the general manager and co-owner of Maple Lodge explained that the company rents the fans, have now installed a fail-safe device. The machines cannot be turned on without the fan automatically coming on at the same time. Also, should the fan break down, as was possible on Friday, the machine will immediately shut itself off.

This is the first incident of its kind at Maple Lodge, and Mr. May has taken every measure to ensure it won't happen again.

**Pool Problems A Plague For Halton Hills Council**

Pool problems are plaguing council here as it becomes almost a weekly matter to sort out the troubles with the new indoor pool being constructed in Georgetown.

Council met in a special meeting Monday to discuss the problem of who would be allowed on the construction site, and to whom the consulting supervisor would report.

Members of the special building committee, Ed Tennant, Bob Lane, and Ed Elaliger complained that they were told to leave the site while performing a routine inspection.

Mr. Tennant added that the consulting supervisor is reporting any problems to Halton Hills recreation director, Doug Collison, and the two men are discussing how to remedy the problems.

"If we're still involved in this project, we feel that any problems should be brought to us," Mr. Tennant said. "Then we make recommendations and it's up to council to pass judgement."

Mr. Tennant added that Mr. Collison did not have any practical knowledge to handle construction problems. "We're not saying the consulting supervisor is doing a bad job, it's just that we don't know," he said.

Mr. Lane added that the three men had found something wrong at the pool and wanted some guidance about what to do with the information.

"We don't want to cost the town \$5,000 to \$10,000 in one year," he said. "We're taxpayers too and we're here to direct you people on what we think is right."

Councillor Ric Morrow moved that the building committee be allowed on the site to perform inspections and that the consulting supervisor report to the committee through Mr. Elaliger.

"The committee is not being made aware of the problems, the only person who is Mr. Collison," Morrow said. "Any problems should be brought to the whole special building committee and Mr. Elaliger has the right to call a meeting at any time."

The pool has been plagued by minor problems and set backs from the beginning, due to a variety of troubles. During the tendering process, only one tender was received for the general contracting around the pool.

Also, in the tender, one of the firms backed out, making it necessary to re-tender all the electrical work for a higher price.

Another problem was finding top soil after the excavating began. The site behind the Georgetown and District High School, was a land fill site for a ravine.

Finding proper consulting supervisors was also a problem. Mr. Lane, Mr. Tennant, and Mr. Elaliger volunteered their time to supervise the project for free.

However, they requested to be let out of their verbal agreement when they found out it required approving shop drawings. These are plans of actual pieces of equipment which will be used in the pool construction.
