Sir:
My family and I are moving to Australia and I could not leave the country without leaving my say regarding the Georgetown and District Branch of The Canadian Red Cross Society. In the last nine years I have been very involved with this Branch, and I have the highest regard for each and every volunteer I had the privilege to work with. I shall never forget the many friends I have made through Red Cross. How Rev. Ruggie, a minister, could ever accuse a person like Dick Perrott, a volunteer, of making "political hay" I'll never know.
If I could only tell everyone in Georgetown how badly Dick and the rest of the executive felt about discontinuing the Homemaker Service, I would. I am aware of what it meant to the people who needed the service as I know most of them through working with the Victorian Order of Nurses. Rev. Ruggie was definitely

misinformed when he said Ontario Division Red Cross would fully finance the Homemaker Service. Ontario Division did say they would help out until the end of 1974 but as the local Branch had no supervisor, nor Homemaker it was felt it would be unfair to hire these people for such a short time.
Rev. Ruggie was also mistaken regarding the Advisory Committee; this Committee was set up at the same time as the Homemaker Service and its duty was only to advise and make recommendations to the Branch Executive.
It is important that a man of Rev. Ruggie's position in the community be sure of his facts before he writes such a letter to the newspaper and the community at large should demand a letter of apology from him.

Reply to Rev. Ruggie

Criticism always welcome, but . . .

Sir,
I find it necessary to write in reply to the letter of Rev. Ruggie published in your paper last week. I write not in any personal vein, although I was hurt by the personal tone of the letter, but rather in defence of the Executive of the local branch of Red Cross. The letter contains a number of statements which are either not true or present an image which is not accurate.
1. The "advisory body" referred to in this letter was in fact set up when the service started in 1971. It was revived after a period of inactivity by the present executive to try to make the Homemaker Service more viable. The function of this was entirely advisory in nature making its feelings known to the Executive. However rules and procedures, including the hiring of the supervisor, are in the hands of the Ontario Division of Red Cross.
2. At the meeting held in early June to determine what should happen to the Homemaker Service, the Executive was faced with a situation in which there was no supervisor (she had resigned) and no homemakers. The local branch had advertised for a new supervisor but none of the applicants was found satisfactory for the position by the Ontario Division Homemaker Director. The Executive unanimously decided to terminate the service for the summer months . . . not for all time. As for the picture presented by myself at that meeting, the chairman of the Homemaker Service has stated that the facts were accurate and complete, she attended all the meetings of the advisory body and of the Executive and should therefore be in a position to judge.
3. The decision to discontinue the service, taken in June, was not made for financial reasons. Ontario Division had stated that they would help the branch out financially, but only until the end of the year. At a meeting of the Executive held in September, it was overwhelmingly decided that the service should not start operating again until there was

a solid foundation of financial assistance forthcoming to bear the strain of administrative expenses. At no time was either Regional or Municipal Councils blamed for not providing a grant. After all they should be in the best position to know where their priorities lie. If and when a grant becomes available, from whatever source, the local branch will only be too willing to restart this service.
I hope most sincerely that the letter of Rev. Ruggie will do nothing to negate the thousands of hours which are put in each year by members of Red Cross in this area with no thought other than helping others in need. Criticism is always welcomed, however this should be constructive in nature and entered into when all attempts have been made to elicit the underlying facts.

W. E. Monahan

A retired member of the Owen Sound fire department, William Edward Monahan, 87, died in the Owen Sound General and Marine Hospital, September 30.
Mr. Monahan, son of the late William Monahan and Sarah Goodfellow Monahan, was born and raised on a farm near East Linton in Sarawak Township. In 1911 he established a livery business on Second Ave. E., north of 10th St. The business was sold in 1913 and he joined the Owen Sound fire department. He was promoted to captain in 1947 and after 45 years service with the city retired in 1958. Among his hobbies were bowling and gardening. Many trophies are in his home and his flower gardens on 6th Ave. have been admired for many years.
On November 5, 1914 Mr. Monahan married Isabella McMillan of Ben Allen, who survived.
Also surviving are a daughter, Evelyn, Mrs. E. Pepple of Georgetown, a son William H. of Markham, six grandchildren, and seven great grandchildren, and a brother James of East Linton. He was predeceased by three sisters and one brother.
Mr. Monahan was a member of the Rockcliffe Gospel Temple, Owen Sound, and of the Salvation Army's Over 60's Club.



Pioneer days museum theme

Pioneer Days is the theme of a new museum project in the Credit Valley which will be developed by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority Foundation.
The Credit Valley Conservation Authority (CVCA) announced the plans last week, adding that they have planned and organized under CVCA Foundation Chairman, Howard Stewart, of Huttonville.

However, according to Joan Rollings, the Authority's information officer, the project has to rely heavily on public funding through donations since no provincial grants are available for purely historic projects.
The site of the museum is a farm on 3,000 acres of prime Niagara Escarpment recreational land, in the Silver Creek Conservation area, just north of Georgetown in Halton Hills.
A number of area historical buildings are being dismantled and moved to the site, including the Hillburgh Railway station, which will serve as the main gateway.
Mrs. Rollings also said that the centre theme of the project will be the use of a number of other wooden buildings, including the church shed from the Eden United Church. The CVCA Foundation received its charter in 1956, and has been working to acquire, rehabilitate, and restore historical buildings, artifacts and sites.

New daytime courses offered special for women

The new Mississauga Campus at 1 Port St. will feature a series of daytime courses starting the week of October 28 in addition to the evening courses that are already in progress.
Using the latest techniques, students will learn to increase reading speed and increase retention of material through a five-week Effective Speed Reading course which will be held every Monday and Wednesday afternoon. The cost is \$25.
During 10 sessions, the Feminine Arts course will examine voice development, the social graces, grooming and wardrobe with emphasis on figure control and basic modelling skills. This course runs for five weeks, Mondays and Wednesdays for \$26.
The Mississauga Campus will also introduce two five-week courses in Crocheting and Macrame for those wishing to expand their creative skills. Each course is \$15.
Crocheting students will learn the different stitches, yarn, increasing and decreasing, and finishing techniques on Friday mornings. During the macrame course every Thursday morning, students will work with four basic knots and discover ways to combine them into creative yet functional items such as well hangings, belts and purses.
In the commercial field, a 10 session Basic Typing course will be offered for the beginner or for persons wanting to upgrade their skills. The course will be held every Monday and Wednesday afternoon for five weeks.
For the antique collector, a special 10 session course has been developed which will cover art, glass, silver and period furniture. The Antique course runs every Monday and Wednesday morning.
Sheridan College invites senior citizens to take Community Services courses at a reduced rate of \$5 each providing space is available. Materials required for the courses are extra.
