## Ruggle replies in homemaker controversy

To the editor of the Herald: The energetic response by the president (Mr. Perrott) and past president (Mrs. Sales) of the local branch of the Red Cross, to my comments about the end of the homemaker service, has been interesting. One might have wished that they had exercised similar enthusiasm in trying to keep the homemakers going. I would like to thank Mrs. Sales for not clouding the issue with facts, and to wish her a good trip to Australia. Mr. Perrott's remarks, however, deserve further comment. I had stated that the advisory body to the homemakers, on which I was

asked to "volunteer" my service, was set up only shortly before the homemakers were forced to fold. Mr. Perrott acknowledges that it "was revived after a period of inactivity". The distinction seems academic. My point was not simply the age or ancestry of the group, but the fact that it was ineffective. Mr. Perrott emphasizes that the function of this group was "entirely advisory". If this was so, then the group had no real function at all, for its advice was never sought by the executive about the basic question of continuing or terminating the service. At the last meeting of the

advisory group, the supervisor had been persuaded to withdraw her resignation, and it seemed that the service would continue. Within a week Ontario division of the Red Cross said that formula was not acceptable to them; the executive (some members of it) decided not to uphold their recommendation to division; other applicants for the post of supervisor were judged to be unsatisfactory; and the executive decided to terminate the service. It was a busy week, and during it the executive did not find time to consult the body whose sole function was to advise about the homemaker service.

The Acton recreation advisory committee will have a chance to meet with the recreation director to discuss the problems between the two today. The meeting at the Acton library at 7 p.m. will allow the recreation director, Doug Collison a chance to explain the problems facing the recreation department, while listening to complaints from the advisory committee. Earlier this month, the advisory committee went to Halton Hills council with a petition complaining about being ignored and not informed about recreation programs in Acton. In a brief to council, Mr. Collison pointed out that the problems between the department and the committee was caused by both sides not getting together. "I cannot speak for the Acton advisory committee, but from our standpoint, July, August and September have been hectic months for us," said the recreation director. In their petition, the committee outlined 12 points of contention with the recreation department. Some of the points were unanswered telephone calls, disapproval of the water safety program run at Fairy Lake, and disapproval with the summer playground program.
