# Beaver and Buffalo included in escape for family

The "Great Escarpment Escape" is on. And it's a fun thing you can bring the whole family to. It starts November 10 and it'll

continue thereafter on weekends. The Escape program is a new family fun thing put on by the Halton Region Conservation Authority.

The goals of the program are to inform the general public about the many areas the Authority owns on the

Escarpment, other than Kelso and Mountbarn, and to promote the use of these areas in the off seasons—winter, spring and fall.

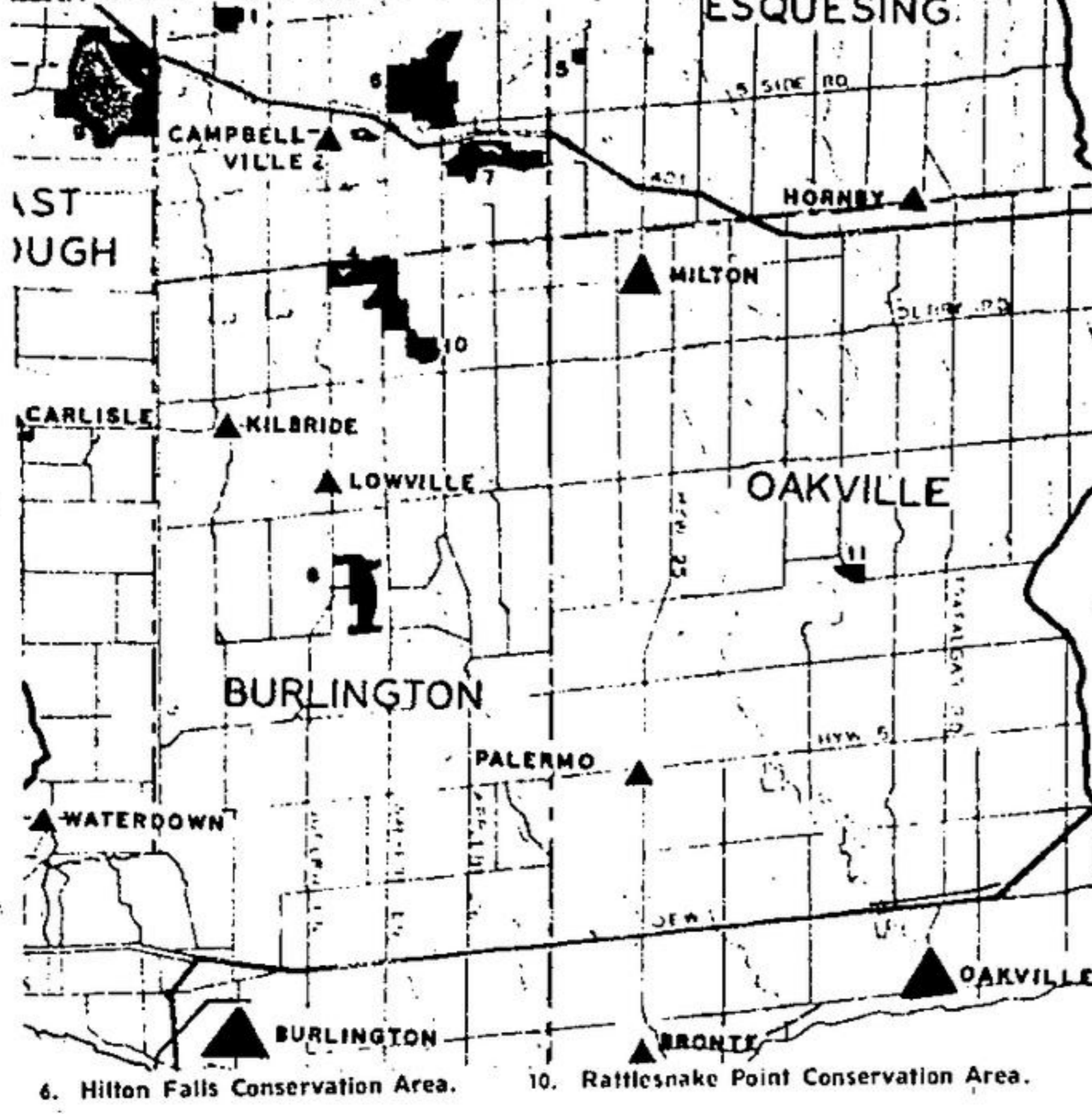
The program will be carried out in November 1974 and January and February of 1975, on Sunday afternoons at two week intervals.

The sessions will vary with activities and will be approximately two hours long. Refreshments will be served at the end of each program.

The first two activities of the "Great Escarpment Escape" are:

**BEAVER HIKE**  
This will include a horse-drawn wagon ride to the falls at the Hilton Falls Conservation Area.

You will be guided to a beaver colony to explore the mysteries of this interesting aquatic mammal. The Beaver was the world's first engineer. While our ancestors were still huddling in caves, this ingenious rodent was sleeping peacefully in his island lodge secure from practically every enemy. It was hundreds of years before man learned from the beaver, to turn a stream into a wide moat surrounding his castle.



The time is Sunday, November 10, 1974-1.00 - 4 p.m. and the place Parking Lot, Hilton Falls Conservation Area Buffalo Romp. The Buffalo were the greatest spectacle of Herd animals the world has ever seen, yet in less than 20 years, the animal was almost hunted to extinction. The Halton Region Conservation Authority has established a small herd of these animals at the Rattlesnake Point Conservation Area. Walk near the Escarpment to observe these interesting animals and learn some of the natural and cultural history of the time of the buffalo. There will be a guide on duty.

## Fishing almost over, so the hunt starts

I must apologize, but due to the holiday weekend and space limitations Ontario Outdoors was not printed.

Many of the seasons are now closed for fishing, and it pays to keep an eye on the fishing regulations.

Just last weekend Oct. 10 the lake trout season closed in areas number four, five (Lake Simcoe), seven (Haliburton), 13 (Algonquin Park), 14, 15 (Parry Sound), although some of these will re-open on Jan. 1. However there are still some areas that are open all year. As for the so called Exotic Fish species, here is a quote direct from the Ontario Fishery Regulations: "Kokanee, Coho and Pink Salmon and the hybrid Spoke, have been planted in certain waters on an experimental basis. Anglers are requested to report the capture of any of these fish to the local Conservation Officer or to any Office of the Ministry of Natural Resources."

How many of you people that have caught any of these fish have reported the "capture" to the aforementioned authorities? If this is done the success of this fishery will be determined and the possibility of better fishing will result. The department will not stock these fish if they are not effective as a sport fish. They are primarily planted as a commercial fish and if we encourage them (the Ministry) I am sure they will do more for us, the sport fishermen.

There are still some of the Coho being caught at the paper mill dam in Georgetown, although they are now few and far between. This is mainly because the dam at Streetville was closed off.

Terry Christie got one on Thursday and Brian Hancock caught a three pound Coho on Saturday. Wally Rundell had luck this past week and young Peter Robbins of Brampton caught a Salmon on his first try for them on Thanksgiving Monday. Don't forget to write to the Ministry of Natural Resources at Parliament Buildings, Toronto, and ask about the dams at Streetville. Ask about the need, the purpose, fish ladders and any other thing about the salmon fishery that you can think of. And ask for a reply!

As for season openings, today, (Oct. 16) all the hunting seasons are open in our area. On this date rabbit, pheasant, Hungarian partridge and bobwhite quail open. So far I have no report of anyone getting a moose, although several have told me they were skunked.
