Children's **Aid Society** seeks new members

President George Heym, of the Children's Aid Society of Halton, says the Society is trying hard to enlarge its membership.

"We would like to involve every person in the community if that were possible. In particular, we hope to attract new people who see the needs for community resources. They could be people who need them for themselves or they could be professionals who are aware, through their work, of what we are lacking."

The Children's Aid president says he has heard of single mothers who desperately want to get off public assistance but who need child care help to take a job or retraining.

"We know of families who need psychiatric service for the mother or the father but there is none to be had in the small community where they live. We need clinics for treatment and also for assessment of children, available to all of

"We want these things in our communities - not in some far away city where a person has to leave home to get help."

The Society believes that these services will not come about unless there is a public demand for them. Executive Director, Dr. Gordon Askwith, says he hopes that the Society can mobilize the community to bring the Region of Halton into line with more advanced communities in Ontario.

Membership entitles the holder to vote at the Annual Meeting for the Board of Directors and on important questions arising at the meeting. Members are also entitled to nominate and to be nominated to the Board. The cost is \$4 per year. For information call 878-2375.

centre's telephone service are

not restricted to youth. Many elderly and lonely people call just for company. Alcoholics and wives of alcoholics call for guidance. Young couples and divorced women with small children seek help in finding ac-

commodation they can afford. Preteens often call because they can't discuss certain things with their parents. It doesn't even have to be a family or an intimate problem. The centre works closely with the YMCA babysitter's course to provide sitters for desperate

VARIETY IN CALLS A telephone volunteer says "there's no end to the variety of calls we receive. Some days we get no calls, other days the phone is ringing off the hook."

The volunteering nurses, teachers. housewives, executives, and ministers work in four hour shifts all day every day. The night shift is eight hours. They are always there to iend an ear to those in need and point them in the right direc-

They work in co-operation with all community services and will refer the caller to a family counsellor, social worker, psychiatrist, lawyer, minister or the Children's Aid. But the most important advantage of the anonymous telephone service is to the person who is suspicious of professionals and prefers to develop a rapport with an ordinary down-to-earth individual like themselves.


The Contact Centre needs
