It seems that my last column, concerning violence in football, has upset some people. They felt that the column implied that there is a certain amount of unnecessary violence and irresponsibility in high school football. I apologize to anyone who took the column that way, because it wasn't intended. The point of the article was to stress the importance of team spirit and aggression in football, especially high school and college football. Kids who play merely for the thrill of violence don't last long in any team, and coaches who are irresponsible towards their players' health quickly lose the support and faith of their team.

Mr. Bob McKay, coach for the Georgetown and District High School junior football team is a dedicated coach whose love for the sport is obvious to anyone playing or connected with the team. He's doing a marvelous job at the high school and I apologize to him for any derogatory inference that may have been construed from my column. To use again Mr. McKay's words, "Football is organized aggression."

People connect violence with evil and perversion. Unfortunately aggression has been lumped together with violence, as something to be restrained and shunned. Yet people are naturally aggressive and it is the success of any society to channel people's aggression into useful and beneficial pursuits. Football provides such a pursuit, as does boxing, hockey and soccer. In fact almost any sport has aggression as an intrinsic ingredient.

Sometimes the aggression spills over into violence; and sometimes the sport gets a bad name when the violence goes unchecked, as in hockey. But this rarely happens in football because of the high level of organization in football. Perhaps that is why football is so successful. In my opinion there is no violence in football, and, coming from a background of Saturday afternoon professional soccer, it's a refreshing change.

Again I would stress that most people play football because of the team spirit involved, not because of any violent element.
