Candlelight service for Vokey-Tregenza wedding

A 7:00 p.m. candlelight service at St. George's Anglican Church, Georgetown, on Friday, October 11th was the setting for the wedding of Hazel Brenda Vokey of Danridge Crescent, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy William Vokey, to Mr. Donald Cree Tregenza of Burlington, youngest son of Dr. and Mrs. William Kenneth Tregenza of Bloomfield Hills, Michigan.

Father R. Gallagher officiated at the double-ring ceremony and organist was Mr. Alan Redmond. The floral arrangements in the chancel were yellow and white chrysanthemums and snapdragons.

The happy occasion coincided with the wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Vokey.

The bride given in marriage by her father, made a white gown of her own design on Empire lines. The bodice, trimmed with seed pearls, and the long sleeves were of plain velvet with the high collar, skirt and train of cut-work velvet in a floral pattern. Her full-length veil was held by a low tiara of small flowers and pearls. She carried a crescent bouquet of deep-toned gold and bronze chrysanthemums in which was inserted as "something old", 52-year old wax orange

blossoms from her maternal grandmother's wedding headpiece, also worn by her mother at her wedding.

Mrs. Jacoba Logan of Brampton, Matron of Honor, wore a turquoise velvet fingertip cape over a halter gown of off-white polyester crepe, scattered with nosegays in the bridal colors.
