The fish were just coming into the harbor area and even though we used everything in the old tackle box all we caught were small ones. There were a lot of fishermen trolling the harbor and none of them had fish. The old story was prevalent, "you should have been here yesterday." We did, however see lots of big trout, many as much as 15 pounds, jumping and rolling, laughing at us I guess.

I hate to do it, but I have to get back to the COHO SALMON controversy. In defence I will quote the ministry of natural resources newsletter No. 30, September 1974. "The fish are preparing to spawn and here's news for the many anglers whose favorite spot has been the vicinity of Streetsville. The McCarthy Mill dam has been washed out and now the fish can go farther up stream; the Reid Mill dam may be altered to permit fish past it and the Hydro Dam was also washed out this spring. The Hydro dam is being repaired but even so, an extra half-mile of river has been added to the Coho fishery." Unquote.

The Coho Salmon and their message, from Allan Wainio, district biologist with the MONR, "On Tuesday, Oct. 15, 1974 adult Coho Salmon moved up the Credit River in the

thousands. Just up from the mouth of the river, blocked by the government weir, the salmon were backed up for almost a quarter-of-a-mile. The fish were shoulder to shoulder, thrashing and struggling to make headway upstream. Jerry Smitka, graduate biologist and the crew leader at the weir could not believe what he saw. Up until that time the salmon run had been slow although steady. After five years of stocking. After several lamprey control treatments. After many small runs over the past four years. After all the premature predictions. THE COHO FINALLY RETURNED.

"On that Tuesday the students counted a little over 4,000 salmon passing through the weirs. The message is Lake Ontario can produce, if given half a chance. Too many people wonder about the potential of the lake. It is now a fairly clean lake with a leaping population of Smelt, Alewife and Perch, a sound food base for the Salmon and Rainbows.

"The salmon now struggling up the many rapids and battering themselves against useless dams have a simple story to tell. Lake Ontario needs those rivers open, not polluted, drained, channelled and dammed." End of article by Allan Wainio.
