trees: The Ministry of Natural Resources wishes to inform the public that it is illegal to cut, mutilate or destroy any trees of any species, unless authorized by a district cutting license. This means the cutting of trees for any purpose, including firewood material. I know T.C. will be glad to hear of this ruling he did not recognize before.

Shorelines of lakes, streams banks and road sides are generally off limits to cutting. This is in order to preserve aesthetics, or the natural beauty of the shores. Before any cutting is carried out, obtain a permit from the ministry.

I know this is late but the trapping season opened on the 25th of October.



Some of these seasons last until next year. Muskrat, for example, closes next April 30 and Mink is the only one to close within the confines of 1974. Trapping is only permitted under the sanction of a licence, and wild fur may be sold by the trapper to licensed fur dealers or at the larger fur sales held by the Ontario Trappers Association and the Hudsons Bay Co.

And in case you thought that fly-in fishing and hunting parties never get checked Conservation Officers, Bob McGillivray, aircraft enforcement officer, last year checked 1,641 anglers and hunters, including 983 non-resident fishermen,. Violations generally run higher for fly-in fishermen and hunters than for the more conventional styles of transport. Seventy-nine charges were laid: 23 overlimits of fish and 25 loaded firearms in boats were the main offences. Fines totalled \$4,649 and averaged about \$58 per charge. The Ministry intends to maintain and improve this type of surveillance.


