ONTARIO OUTDOORS

Save our swamps

SWAMPS ARE NOT FOREVER! Preserve them. If you would only sit down at the side of a swamp some day, you would see a world that is often hidden to the casual observer. The abundance of life that stems from the area of a swamp is phenomenal to say the least. All seasons of the year are full of activities and each has a beauty of its own.

If you can see beauty in the outdoors, then maybe you should take up some other form of activity. Urban and industrial landfill developments schemes have in many cases encroached upon wetlands. Flood control projects divert waters destined for marshes, some have gone so far as to actually flood them. Notable are some hydro electric projects.

Professing to justify their benefits in terms of flood control, they, in turn, flood thousands of acres of fertile valley bottomlands behind their structures.

We have been slow to learn. Drainage programs have added little to the overall agricultural base, but have made significant inroads into the inventory of remaining wildlife habitat, at public expense. Also we have not learned from the past mistakes of the USA, where they too once drained their marshes, and have now come full circle in their attempt to replace those marshes and wetlands that they once destroyed.

Grouse hunting has been fairly good in the area of Tweed, where moose hunting is popular. If you shoot a grouse you often scare away any moose. Maybe this is why the moose and deer hunting have not been too good. The hunters are shooting the grouse. Whatever the reason there are a lot of disappointed hunters. Not that everyone did not succeed.

The Gravenhurst area has also been good for grouse, but all the other areas are as forecasted, and show poor hunting. Deer and, believe it or not, Moose are also in the Gravenhurst region.

A question that has been asked many times and has caused a lot of discussion and argument, is the ownership of the bed or a river. The Public Lands Act, gives the following information: The beds of navigable waters act, establishes that, in the absence of an express grant, the bed of navigable body of water was not intended to pass and did not pass to the grantee. Note the word "navigable."

Further to the matter of cutting

trees: The Ministry of Natural Resources wishes to inform the public that it is illegal to cut, mutilate or destroy any trees of any species, unless authorized by a district cutting license. This means the cutting of trees for any purpose, including firewood material. I know T.C. will be glad to hear of this ruling he did not recognize before.

Shorelines of lakes, streams banks and road sides are generally off limits to cutting. This is in order to preserve aesthetics, or the natural beauty of the shores. Before any cutting is carried out, obtain a permit from the ministry.

I know this is late but the trapping season opened on the 25th of October.

Some of these seasons last until next year. Muskrat, for example, closes next April 30 and Mink is the only one to close within the confines of 1974. Trapping is only permitted under the sanction of a licence, and wild fur may be sold by the trapper to licensed fur dealers or at the larger fur sales held by the Ontario Trappers Association and the Hudsons Bay Co.

And in case you thought that fly-in fishing and hunting parties never get checked Conservation Officers, Bob McGillivray, aircraft enforcement officer, last year checked 1,641 anglers and hunters, including 983 non-resident fishermen. Violations generally run higher for fly-in fishermen and hunters than for the more conventional styles of transport. Seventy-nine charges were laid: 23 overlimits of fish and 25 loaded firearms in boats were the main offences. Fines totalled \$4,649 and averaged about \$58 per charge. The Ministry intends to maintain and improve this type of surveillance.

Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Nov. 29 and 30 and the 1st of December are the dates of the 27th annual Convention of the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters. If you are a member then you should have the information in letter form from the federation. You should make a point of going and taking part in the programs to improve our Ontario Outdoors.
