Windsor's winter lesson

Windsor had a very severe storm on election day, and because of this we may see some changes in our elections, both in the municipal and provincial fields, and particularly in the matter of their

As you know the Municipal Act now requires that all local elections be held on the first Monday in December, and further that the polls must be open from 11 a.m. until 8 p.m. Well, in the border city conditions were so bad that some polls couldn't open on time.

ACT CLUMBY: This meant they couldn't be open the nine hours that the Municipal Act requires.

The Act says that the polls must be open for a full contimuous nine hours. And it provides that when this impossible because of an emergency they then must be open the following day and if they still can't fulfill the requirement on subsequent days until it is possible for them to do so.

The Windsor experience showed two things. One was how clumsy the Municipal Act is on this requirement. For instance, if some polls complete the full nine hours and others don't, how is the voter to know which polls will be open the following day and which won't

Then there is the second factor that it was illustrated that in most parts of Ontario, December can be a hazardous time to hold an election. Insofar as storms go it can be one of our most hazardous months.

BE EARLIER The reason for setting the December date originally was that this would mean that in coming councils wouldn't have too long a time standing by while waiting to take over on January 1.

But in practical terms another month's waiting time shouldn't be too much of a handicap. In fact it would give a further period to familiarize themselves with their up-coming work and be better prepared from the start.



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


