Five town bowlers for finals

Five Georgetown bowlers, competing against over 80 competitors for spots on the Central Ontario Bowlers Association (COBA) teams for the Carling O'Keefe Open, came up with 30-game total scores which were good enough to qualify them.

The action took place in four separate bowling centres over the past three Sundays. The first week saw competition at Crystal Bowl and Brampton Lanes, both in Brampton. The second week, bowlers met at Village Bowl in Mississauga. The final and deciding block of 10 games was held last Sunday at Georgetown Bowl.

In the women's division, Georgetown's Marg Bratkin proved to be the top shooter with a 30-game total of 7284. That's a 242 average. Georgetown's Charlene MacCormack also qualified among the women. Her score of 6923 placed her in sixth position.

For the men, Bill Anderson

was the highest qualifier from Georgetown. His score of 7670 placed him third. Other qualifiers from Georgetown were Jim Nicholson who placed fifth with 7511, and George Barber, whose 7223 total put him into ninth place.

A total of nine women and 10 men qualified, forming three teams that will represent central Ontario in three different team events at the Carling-O'Keefe Open, Eastern Canada Finals next February.
