Sheep producers interested in ewe(s)

Some 75 members and friends of the Zone 3 Ontario Sheep Association meeting of Saturday morning, December 7 at the White Horse Inn, Paris for the annual meeting. In charge were Fred Lowden, RR1 Smithville, as president and Doug Gardhouse, RR5 Milton, as secretary-treasurer.

Following the business meeting a delicious roast lamb dinner was served.

George Phillips a member of the Ontario Sheep Marketing Council, discussed the ac-tivities of this council. He stated that funds would be available to zone associations and to 4-H Sheep Clubs in the coming year. The government is being asked to support the Ewe Retention Program where sheep producers would be subsidized for ewes kept in the

Raymond Comfort, president of the Canadian Sheep Association, informed everyone that the Canadian annual meeting would be held this year in our zone on February 25 and 26 in the Sheraton-Connaught Hotel, Hamilton. The Ontario association will be meeting on the 25th, followed by the Canadian association's banquet that evening and their annual

meeting the next day. Jack Gartshore, vicepresident of our Zone and director to the Ontario Sheep Association, discussed the wool check-off program which is to be implemented. The proposed check-off is three cents per pound of wool from each producer in Ontario. This will be used by the Ontario Association to promote lamb and wool, etc.

Guest speaker, Dave Collie from New Zealand, suggested we could improve our efficiencies by thinking about income per acre and per man rather than per ewe. It is normal in New Zealand for one man to look after 2,000 ewes, even at lambing time. He suggested we could make better uses of financing throughout Ontario to use many acres of which are now sitting idle for sheep production.

New officers chosen for 1975 were: past president - Fred Lowden, RR1 Smithville; president, John Gartshore, RR3 Dundas; vice-president, Lloyd Deeks, RR2 Copetown; secretary-treasurer, Henry J Stanley, RR2, Rockwood; and assistant secretary-treasurer and director from Halton, Doug Gardhouse, RRS Milton.
