Where to go and how

Did you make those same dumb resolutions this new year, or did you possibly try to make some sensible ones? Like some of the things I have mentioned in this column in the past year? Such as "be a conservationist," or "clean up your act" or "clean up after others," and "teach sportsmanship." Personally I never make new years resolutions, as I feel that they are seldom kept. If you come across something during the year, take it up as a resolution right then. Prove to others that you do have the interest of the outdoors at heart. If some people think hunters are "slaughtering all our moose" then read these figures: In the 1973 hunt in the Temagami Region only 8.1 per cent of hunters are successful. Slightly more than that is noted for this year. All those fulfilled licenses paid for the betterment of moose range and study. That is tangible help in the field of conservation. Grouse hunting was a little better than last year in the same area, although it is still poor as I predicted. It took almost six and one-half hours per man hunting to bag one grouse. The increase is small but hopefully the grouse population is on the upswing and we should expect better results as the normal cycle will soon provide a bumper crop. As to the letter mentioned in last week's column in which Mrs. Halst asked about areas catering to non fisher and hunter. Leuenberger Air Service, Box 22, Nakina, Ont. P0T 2H0 will provide all you need for a trip to view the magnificent scenery in the James Bay Watershed area. Apparently they have just bought out the Nakia base of Superior Airways and are now able to arrange trips for you with your own gear. With a topo map of the area you can pick any location and they can put you in there if it can be done at all. I would personally suggest Kapikotonga Lake where you may canoe into Tennant Lake, Tester Lake and Melchett Lake. All of them are very scenic and well worth the effort. I was up there this past year and saw moose, beaver, mink, and a bald eagle. I would also suggest thinking about it now and booking as early as possible to avoid disappointment. Last February I mentioned the tagging of the White Fish in Lake Simcoe and will bring you up to date on it next week along with something on ice fishing and ice thickness and the new fishing regulations. 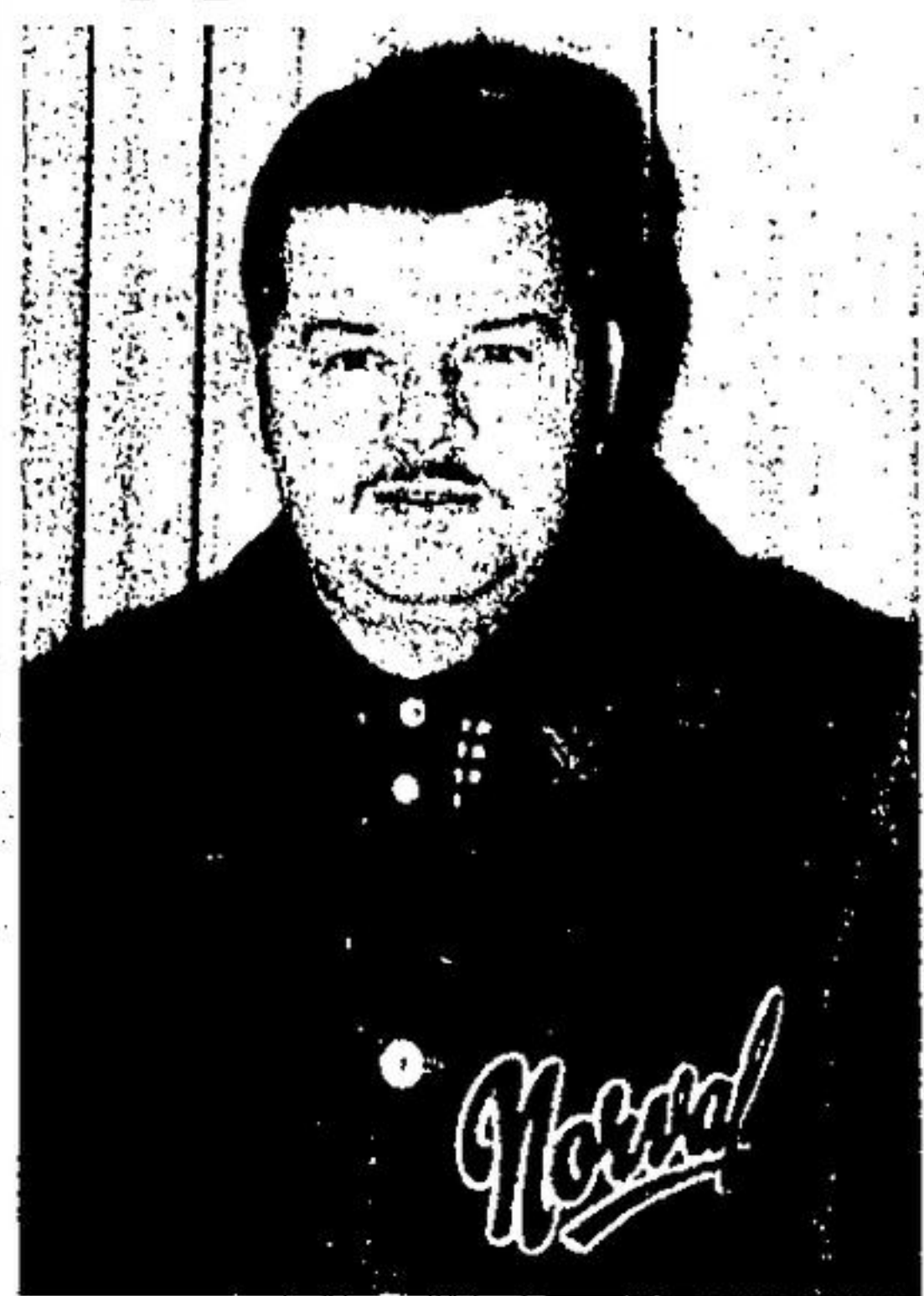

Coaches Corner

Key word for centres: aggressive



Kent Riddall has been associated with Georgetown hockey in one form or another for many years. A lifelong resident of Georgetown, Kent went through the whole minor hockey system here and played for the now defunct Georgetown Junior "C" club. He has played Junior "B" hockey and has had some Junior "A" experience with both Hamilton and St. Catharines. At present he is coach of Norval, the league leaders in the local Industrial league and has been with the club since 1961, both as a player and for the past two years as coach. Kent and his wife Diane have a five-year-old daughter, Karen. Kent's advice this week is for centremen. A centremen must be a good skater. This can only come through hours and hours of practice. Also, he should be a better than average stickhandler, with the ability to make passes either off his backhand or forehand. Again, this can only come with practice. The centremen is the leader in the attacking zone. He should be the first man into the opposing end and he must decide whether to go for the puck or position himself in the slot. The slot being that area roughly 15 feet in front of the goalie. When the opposing team is coming out of their end, the centremen should pick up the last forward and allow his wingers or the defencemen to concentrate on the puck carrier. In his own end, the centre is basically a floater. He picks up the open man but should always be prepared to break down the ice, should his team gain possession of the puck. The centremen's prime purpose is, naturally, the winning of face-offs. Once again, practice will make the better player. Before each face-off, the centre must look around and fix in his mind the exact positioning of his players. He should move them if necessary. Then he must decide how the faceoff is to be handled. This will depend on where the face-off is being held. However, the centre must be able to draw the puck behind him, to either side or simply knock it forward. Anticipation is the key to winning face-offs. Be aggressive, even if the referee waves you off at times. The faster you make your move, the better chance you have of winning the face-off and giving your team the advantage. Kent would suggest that aspiring young centres watch the master of that position, Phil Esposito of the Boston Bruins.
