Coaches Corner

Key word for centres: aggressive



Kent Riddall has been associated with Georgetown hockey in one form or another for many years. A lifelong resident of Georgetown, Kent went through the whole minor hockey system here and played for the now defunct Georgetown Junior "C" club. He has played Junior "B" hockey and has had some Junior "A" experience with both Hamilton and St. Catharines. At present he is coach of Norval, the league leaders in the local Industrial league and has been with the club since 1981, both as a player and for the past two years as coach. Kent and his wife Diane have a five-year-old daughter, Karen.

Kent's advice this week is for centremen. A centremen must be a good skater. This can only come through hours and hours of practice. Also, he should be a better than average stickhandler, with the ability to make passes either off his backhand or forehand. Again, this can only come with practice.

The centreman is the leader in the attacking zone. He should be the first man into the opposing end and he must decide whether to go for the puck or position himself in the slot. The slot being that area roughly 15 feet in front

of the goaler. When the opposing team is coming out of their end, the centreman should pick up the last forward and allow his wingers or the defencemen to concentrate on the puck

carrier. In his own end, the centre is basically a floater. He picks up the open man but should always be prepared to break down the ice, should his team gain possession of the

The centreman's prime purpose is, naturally, the winning of face-offs. Once again, practice will make the better player. Before each face-off, the centre must look around and fix in his mind the exact positioning of his players. He should move them if necessary. Then he must decide how the faceoff is to be bandled. This will depend on where the face-off is being held. However, the centre must be able to draw the puck behind him, to either side or

simply knock it forward. Anticipation is the key to winning face-offs. Be aggressive, even if the referee waves you off at times. The faster you make your move, the better chance you have of winning the face-off and giving your team the advantage.

Kent would suggest that aspiring young centres watch the master of that position, Phil Esposito of the Boston Bruins.
