## Charles Parton dies in 85th year

Charles Parton, a former Smith and Stone employee died at Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital January 1. Mr. Parton, from Stoke-on-Trent, England, came to Georgetown in 1929 and was employed by Smith and Stone. In September of that year his wife and three children joined him in town.  
He retired in 1962 after working several years at Avro in Malton.  
An active member of the Legion and the Imperials for 40 years, Mr. Parton resided at Sargent Court since it opened in 1973.  
He was predeceased by his

wife, Mary Ellen in 1972 and is survived by daughters Nelly (Mrs. James Fox) of Georgetown, Eva (Mrs. Alex Wilson) of Milton and a son, Alan, also of Milton.  
There are also eight grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Funeral services for the services held at McClure-Jones Funeral home were: nephews George and Bob Webster, grandsons Ken and Brian Parton, Peter Griswold and Douglas Traflet. Interment was at Greenwood Cemetery.  
Mr. Parton died in his 85th year.

## Ab Cordingley dies

A former Georgetown hardware store owner died in Viro, Florida, last Tuesday of a heart attack, at the age of 98.

Albert Edward (Ab) Cordingley was the oldest man to hold an Ontario driver's licence. Mr. Cordingley was born in Wallace Township and raised in Park Head. He was part of a family of 13. He lived in Shallow Lake where he operated a general store and served as reeve for several years.

In addition to enjoying working in the garden, Mr. Cordingley also served on the Bruce Peninsula District Memorial Hospital's board of governors. He was a member of St. John's United Church in Warton where he served as treasurer.  
He was a past member of the Rotary Club and served as treasurer for the Crippled Children's committee. He also served on the parks board and Chamber of Commerce.  
Mr. Cordingley's wife, Ann Holland, died in 1969 after

which Mr. Cordingley lived with one of his nephew's widows, Mrs. Mary Cordingley.  
Mr. Cordingley was an avid reader and book collector. At one time he owned over 500 books, some dating back to the 18th century. He also owned one edition of Salvis Josephus' Antiquities of the Jews which dates back to 1735.

After selling his share in Hunter Hardware, Mr. Cordingley had time to pursue his other interest, travelling across Canada. Mr. Cordingley was secretary-treasurer of the Hepworth Anglers Club and in 1964 helped establish the Bruce Peninsula Resort Association.

Mr. Cordingley was predeceased by sisters Eleanor (Mrs. James Hupler), Muriel (Mrs. Grant Legate), Minia (Mrs. Robert Young), Lily (Mrs. Reeves), Edith (Mrs. Martin), Alice (Mrs. Elkerton) and Emma.  
He was also predeceased by brothers James, Lionel and Philip.
