

Raiders gain second place: set sights on Sailors

The Georgetown Chrysler Raiders picked up five of a possible six points this past week, and moved into second place, one point ahead of Fort Erie and only four points behind the league leading Port Colborne Sailors.

The Raiders travelled to Dundas last Friday night where they were tied 4-4 by a surprisingly aroused Dundas Merchants. For the first time in quite a while, the Raiders had a full roster but extra manpower was to no avail as even a ten-minute overtime period failed to produce an outright winner.

It looked for awhile as if the Raiders would pick up an easy two points as they were leading 3-1 at the end of the first period. But then Merchants goaler, Gerry Aussem, who always seems to be especially effective against the Raiders, played kitty-bar-the-door and the Raiders weren't able to score again until the 12:12 mark of the third period.

The Merchants came out flying in the final frame and put three discs behind Raiders'

goaler Keith Pallett, the final goal coming at the 16:55 mark to knot the game at 4-4.

Four Raiders figured in Friday's scoring. Bob Gendron, Neil Cotton, Ray Evans and Paul Burger, all firing a goal apiece. For the Merchants, Joe Donald had a pair, while singles went to Tom Packham and Jim McCurry. The Merchants outshot the Raiders, 41-38.

On Sunday, back in the friendly confines of the Georgetown arena, the Raiders exhibited a hustling, checking brand of hockey and blanketed the Oakville Adanacs 5-0. This was Raiders' goaler Keith Pallett's first shutout of the year. His mates must be given equal credit for the goose egg as they only allowed the Adanacs 29 shots on goal while they pelted Adanac's goaler, Mario MacDonald, with 41 drives.

Most of the scoring was done in the opening stanza as the Raiders served notice that they wanted the win, outshooting Oakville 15-9. The Raiders came out with fire in their eyes

and scored three times before 11 minutes elapsed.

Frank Hincks, who had just completed his suspension the game before, opened the scoring from Paul Burger and John Boyce at the 4:12 mark. Gerry Pearson picked up the first of his two goals of the night less than three minutes later as he converted passes from Bob Gendron and Tom Gilbert. It was obvious at this point that the Adanacs weren't really in

the game and questions arose as to just how many goals the Raiders would put behind the harassed Oakville cage tender. Bob Gendron made it 3-0 at the 10:27 mark, Gerry Pearson and Tom Gilbert drew assists.

The game settled down to a close checking affair after this but the Raiders bluffed the red light twice more in the second period to take the rest of the steam out of Oakville. Gerry Pearson scored at the 7:14 mark

from Bill Currie and Bob Gendron. Pete Bettlorf from Paul Burger and Frank Hincks rounded out the scoring at the 13:24 mark of the second.

The Raiders have two games remaining in the regular schedule. This Thursday they travel to Dunnville for a tussle with the cellar dwelling Mudcats, while on Friday night, here in Georgetown, in what has all the earmarks of a thriller, the Raiders tangle with

league leaders, Port Colborne Sailors.

Depending on how the two teams fare in their earlier games, Friday's contest could turn out to be a battle for first.

As yet, due to the tightness of the league race and some misunderstandings, the format for the playoffs has not been finalized. A league meeting is scheduled for this Sunday in Oakville and hopefully all problems will be ironed out.
