Georgetown champions of Halton-Peel

Last week, prior to his team's departure for the Peel-Halton Championships at Perdue High School in Oakville, coach Lew Martin had dutifully suggested the possibility that six or seven of the All-Ontario. Much to his surprise, and delight, nine of his boys gained All-Ontario berths.

To top off this triumph, the team as a whole, literally wiped out all other schools, finishing with a commanding 61-point lead over their nearest competitor. Georgetown finished with an even 100 points. Nelson had 39 points, Bramalea had 38 points, Streetsville chalked up 34 points, while Oakville and Erindale tied for last place with 29 points.

Martin was obviously hoping for tougher opposition, but he diplomatically noted that the competition had improved greatly this past year and should give our region good representation in the All-Ontario. The All-Ontario will be held this coming weekend in London.

First place winners and their respective weight classes included; Pete Fournier, 83 lbs.; Dave Paterson 90 lbs.;

Rick Rodgers 88 lbs.; Pat Fobert 123 lbs.; Eric Fobert 130 lbs.; Bill Bradley 136 lbs.; Wayne Martin 141 lbs. and John Pendergast 148 lbs.

Brian Pendergast placed second in the 90 lb. class, Bill Fournier was fourth in the 98 lb. class, Ted Phillips notched a third in the 106 lb. class while Phil Noble fought his way to a third place finish in the 178 lb. class. Andy Caman held on to finish second in the 194 lb. class, while Jeff Haines battled to third spot in the heavyweight class. Coach Martin also pointed out that, although Victor Farkas, Rick Sommerville, Martin Fournier, Steve Crossman, Steve Turner and Gary Miller did not place, they all put up fine performances.

This was the last meet of the year for the team and, although only nine boys qualified for the All-Ontario—a singular feat in itself—the whole team deserves hearty congratulations for a tremendously successful year and for adding another feather in Georgetown's athletic cap.

All the first place finishers, with the exception of Pete Fournier in the 83 lb. class, qualified for the All-Ontario. Andy Caman and Brian

Pendergast, who finished second in their respective weight divisions, similarly qualified. The school's and the town's best wishes go with the boys in their quest for Ontario titles this weekend.

The Senior Boys team started the day off right. Led by a fantastic 935 triple by Steve Burns, the Georgetown team rolled 3,473 to capture first place honors.
